KARL KIM, PH.D. DEPARTMENT OF URBAN AND REGIONAL PLANNING. UNIVERSITY OF HAWAI'I AT MÂNOA



Karl Kim, PhD., is Professor of Urban and Regional Planning at the University of Hawaii at Manoa, and Director of the graduate program in Disaster Management and Humanitarian Assistance. He holds appointments in the Center for Korean Studies and the School of Architecture at the University of Hawaii. He studies transportation, cities, and resilience (https://orcid.org/0000-0003-0528-8747). He was educated at Brown University and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and has been a Fulbright scholar to Korea and the Russian Far East.

Previously, he served as the Chief Academic Officer (Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs) overseeing tenure and promotion, accreditation, strategic planning, and program review for the Manoa campus. He is Executive Director of the National Disaster Preparedness Training Center (ndptc.hawaii.edu), authorized by the U.S. Congress to develop and deliver FEMA certified training courses for underserved, at-risk communities on natural hazards, mitigation, and urban planning. The Center has trained more than 55,000 first responders, emergency managers, and leaders in over 500 communities across the world. Dr. Kim has served as Chairman of the National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (ndpc.us). He serves on the board of the North American Alliance for Hazards and Disaster Research Institutes (https://www.naahdri.org/) and the Pacific Risk Management Ohana (https://coast.noaa.gov/primo/).

He is Editor-in-Chief of Transportation Research Interdisciplinary Perspectives (Elsevier) and Section Editor of Transportation Research Part D (Environment) and is editing a 10-volume series on disaster risk reduction and resilience (Routledge). He has developed and led research and training programs in Vietnam, Philippines, and Indonesia.

GUAM WATERWORKS AUTHORITY, SENIOR REGULATORY ANALYST

Vangie is a Senior Regulatory Analyst with the Guam Waterworks Authority. Her primary responsibility at GWA is to ensure compliance environmental regulations related to safe and clean water. Vangie has been appointed as the Chair for the Governor of Guam's Climate Change and Resiliency Commission and the Co-Chair for the Governor's Guam Green Growth Initiative. Vangie is also appointed by the Governor as Focal Point for the Micronesia Challenge for Guam. She started her career in government service as the Geographic Information System Manager at the Bureau of Statistics and Plans and was the Administrator for the Guam Coastal Management Program.

This session will focus on presenting the findings related to the investigation of various flooding issues that the Guam Silver Jackets Flood Policy Working Group presented during the 2020 Assembly of Planners' Symposium. It will examine the physical, regulatory, and policy root causes of problems that contribute to the hinderance of flood prevention as well as flood solutions and financing. The panel will cover how the National Flood Insurance Program requirements is being applied to development as well as set the stage for Guam's progress toward complying with the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Program.





FOOD RECOVERY UPDATE

CORY HINDS, P.E., JACOBS

Mr. Hinds is the Jacobs Project Manager for the development and implementation of a sustainable materials management program for Guam. With 25 years of experience in planning, design, construction administration, solid waste, wastewater, transportation, site development, and facilities, Mr. Hinds has developed a reputation for developing practical, cost-effective technical solutions tailored to the project need. He has direct experience in sustainable materials management; landfill design, construction and operation; and biosolids composting. He has personally worked on this Guam food donation project for the last 2 years.

This Session will cover an update on food recovery project between the Hyatt Regency Guam, Salvation Army, and Guam Department of Public Health and Social Services.

BIOSOLIDS COMPOSTING

CONCHITA TAITANO GEPA Air and Land Administrator

Conchita has been with the Guam Environmental Protection Agency (Guam EPA) for 29 years and working as the Air and Land Division Administrator for over 22 years overseeing the Air Program, Pesticides Program, Hazardous Waste Program (which includes RCRA C, RCRA I and SPCC), and the Solid Waste Program. Conchita received her Bachelor of Science in Biology and Masters of Science degrees from the University of San Francisco. In addition, she studied Environment and Sustainable Development from the United Nations University in Tokyo, Japan. She also studied Environmental Policy Making from the UNESCO Water Institute in the Delft, Netherlands.

Mr. Williams has a 39-year career in environmental engineering with operating and design experience and a specific emphasis on biosolids management planning, and product utilization. Prior to joining FEMA, Ms. Stanton served as Director for the Center for Radiological Emergency Management within the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Office of Air and Radiation. Ms. Stanton also worked in EPA's Office of Emergency and Remedial Response, developing Superfund policy and supporting Regional cleanup efforts. Earlier experience with the EPA included several years in the field coordinating responses to oil spills and hazardous substance releases and corresponding cleanup efforts. Ms. Stanton's private sector experience extends to working with an environmental/emergency management consulting firm and a strategic management firm.

Ms. Stanton has a B.A. in Political Science and Chemistry from Wellesley College, an M.S. in Chemistry from the California Institute of Technology, and an M.A. from the Naval Postgraduate School in Security Studies (Homeland Security and Defense).



CNMI SMART SAFE GROWTH AND THE IMPORTANCE OF INTEGRATED PLANNING

KATHRYN (KATIE) LIPIECKI, FEMA Region 9 Mitigation Division Director

As Mitgation Division Director, Ms. Lipiecki oversees the regional implementation of mitigation programs, including the flood mapping program, Hazard Mitigation Planning program, multi-million dollar disaster and non-disaster mitigation grants such as the Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities and Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, floodplain management and flood insurance programs, and Environmental and Historic Preservation compliance. Prior to joining Region 9 in 2020, Katie was the hazard mitigation division director in Puerto Rico, supporting recovery efforts for hurricanes Irma and Maria, and the 2020 earthquakes. In this role, she oversaw the implementation of various mitigation program areas, including the \$3.6 billion Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, and supported the obligation of over \$115 million for 406 mitigation. She holds a Master of Science in Urban Planning from Columbia University in New York City, where she concentrated in housing policy, and has a Bachelor of Arts in Historic Preservation and American Studies from Goucher College in Baltimore, Maryland.
