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Introduction and Background

Homelessness is prevalent throughout the world, even on our island paradise of Guam. Fortunately, many agencies exist on island to provide a variety of services to the homeless population. However, to continue improving the provision of these services, information about the size of the homeless population and its underlying issues is necessary. This information will help create a comprehensive care system that will prevent and reduce homelessness on Guam.

The April 2000 Guam homeless count revealed that there were 142 homeless people staying in shelters throughout the island. There were 353 confirmed homeless people living in areas other than shelters. The total homeless population was 495. In addition, an estimated 71 unconfirmed homeless people were identified.

In response to a request from the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority, the Salvation Army conducted a point-in-time census of the homeless population living in shelters on Guam on October 20, 2000. The results from this count will aid in developing a continuum of care process that will help meet the needs of the homeless as they move to a more stable housing situation and work towards self-sufficiency goals. By identifying high percentage sub-populations, we will be able to recognize what the needs are regarding specific types of shelters and supportive service programs for the homeless. It will also provide a better understanding of the demographic characteristics of the homeless population on Guam.

We are glad to have been involved in the planning and carrying out of this homeless count because it has made us aware of the amount of individuals on Guam currently living in this arrangement and the issues underlying this problem. We appreciate the support and cooperation from other agencies involved in this effort. Many hands and hearts were put into this project, and for each of the individuals who took part, we are grateful for their contribution.

Methodology

The single day shelter count process was used to conduct this census. It consisted of counting those individuals and families staying in emergency or transitional shelters as well as permanent supportive housing for the homeless.

Shelter Providers

Data was collected from thirteen different shelters. Below is a list of each shelter and a brief explanation of their program:

Guam Continuum of Care Survey Committee

All shelter providers were encouraged to be a part of a committee, initiated by the Guam Continuum of Care Coalition, to plan, prepare and carry out the homeless census. A list of members in this Survey Committee, and others who assisted in this effort, can be found in the appendix section of this report.

Committee Meetings

Survey Committee members were asked to attend meetings at the Salvation Army One Stop Homeless Assistance Center on September 6, 2000 and October 11, 2000. Representatives from 9 shelter programs attended. The agencies present were Catholic Social Services, Sanctuary Inc., Guma Mami and the Salvation Army. A representative from the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Guma Ifil Program was not able to attend both meetings. However, a Guma Ifil worker was briefed on the meetings and furnished with the materials that were distributed.

The meetings' purpose was to compose a survey sheet to be used for the census, develop least burdensome procedures, seek their participation in the effort, and update the agencies on the project. During these meetings, shelter providers were given opportunities to ask questions, air potential difficulties and reveal issues that may arise during data collection.

Due to the shelter providers' participation in the single day shelter count on April 20, 2000, many were already familiar with the method. However, there were a few shelter representatives who were not familiar with the procedures. The 2 meetings prior to the count proved helpful for their understanding of the method.

Data Form

The data form, which can be found in the appendix, was derived from <u>Guide to Continuum of Care Planning and Implementation</u>, a guidebook to facilitate the design and implementation of comprehensive Continuum of Care systems in localities throughout the country. As a result of recommendations and suggestions made by the Survey Committee, a few changes were made to the guidebook's data form. The committee's edited version was used for this census.

Data Collection

Each agency was asked to conduct a count of the individuals and families in their shelter on the day of October 20, 2000. As an incentive, a t-shirt was given to each individual who completed the data form.

With the exception of Alee Children's Shelter, all other shelters completed their forms and submitted the information as requested. A Child Protective Services worker was able to furnish us with information regarding Alee Children's Shelter.

Results

On October 20, 2000, there were 150 homeless people staying in shelters on Guam.

Homeless In Shelters

The following statistics reveal some important trends in the problem of homelessness on Guam:

Barriers and Recommendations For Future Counts

The method used for this census was a fairly simple and inexpensive technique. Generally, everything flowed smoothly during the planning, preparation and implementation of the count. The following are some recommendations for future counts:

- The success of this census was mainly due to each shelter provider's participation in the effort. Shelter providers need to continue to give their support of this project. Guam is fortunate to have a collaborative group of shelter providers that is able to work together to meet the needs of the homeless population and work toward a common goal of preventing homelessness.
- The Survey Committee needs to clarify and resolve confidentiality issues during meetings prior to the count. This was discussed in general during our meetings prior to this recent count. However, there was one shelter that could not give us information as requested. We were referred to another agency that was able to furnish us with the data.

Summary

- On October 20, 2000, there were 150 homeless people staying in emergency, transitional or permanent supportive housing.
- This group consisted of fifty-five percent adults and forty-five percent children.
- There were five percent more males than females, not including the gender percentage of children in families.
- Eight percent were veterans.
- Thirty-six percent stated they have no disability while fifty-three percent have one or more disabilities.
- Forty-five percent stated that a break-up in the family was the reason for their homelessness. Eighteen percent are homeless due to their inability to pay their rent.
- Twenty-three percent stated they are homeless due to their temporary living situation ending. Job loss was the cause of homelessness for sixteen percent.
- Twenty percent have only been homeless less than or equal to a month. Another twenty-one percent have been homeless between two through six months.
- Only eight percent stated that their spouse/life partner was also staying in the shelter.
- Nineteen percent stated that they have children while eighty percent stated they have none. Forty children were residing in the shelter with their parent(s) while fourteen children were living elsewhere.
- Fifty-five percent need a 1-bedroom unit.
- Thirty-six percent receive benefits from the Department of Public Health and Social Services, eleven percent receive financial support from relatives or friends and only seven percent are employed full-time.
- Twenty-five percent stated they were unemployed and seeking work while thirteen percent stated they were unemployed and not seeking work. The remaining sixty-two percent are either employed or did not provide an answer.
- Ninety-three percent received services in the last month. The highest percentage
 of services used was food/hot meals followed by case management, health care
 and life skills training.
- Thirty-one percent were on a waitlist for services. The highest percentage of these services was housing counseling/placement, followed by job help and mental health care.

The information from this census is necessary as the continuum of care planning process continues. Homeless providers will now need to continue gathering together to determine gaps in the continuum of care system, develop strategies with an action plan, and implement those action steps for a successful continuum of care plan. As homeless providers work together with a set of common goals and a common vision, solutions will be developed to move the homeless toward permanent housing and self-sufficiency.
