If Other, Please describe: Guam has a high percentage of people with disabilities but there is currently no system in place to obtain numbers from which an estimate of people with developmental disabilities can be figured. The 2000 Census lists only numbers of people with disabilities. Collaboration is ongoing with public and private service providers to obtain a count of people with developmental disabilities in Guam.

#### B. Environmental Factors Affecting Services

Environmental Factors Topic 1: Social/Economical Factors: Guam is a multi-ethnic. multi-cultural island territory of the United States, located in the Western Pacific. Guam is considered to be rural and remote. Its population of 166,090 (July 2004 est. CIA World Fact Book) is comprised of indigenous Chamorros, Filipinos, Asians, Caucasians. African Americans, and Pacific Islanders/Micronesians. According to the 2000 Census, 39,962 individuals over 5 years of age, listed some form of physical or mental disability. This figure represents 26% of the Census population count. The Census also identified that 2,370 individuals between the ages of 5 and 20 have a disability. There are 17,405 individuals between the ages of 21 and 64 who have a disability. According to the 2000 Population and Housing Profile of Guam, the island has 17,742 individuals aged 55 and older, who comprise 11.4% of Guam's total population. 16% of Guam's households include individuals 65 years and over, and 45% of individuals 65 and older report having a disability. Data from the last 10 years shows that Guam has served only a fraction of these individuals. The Guam Developmental Disabilities Council (GDDC) along with its Tri-Agency partners, and the Department Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID) and the Office of Community Integration (OCI) are working closely to identify those individuals who have developmental and other disabilities, as well as pursuing future funding opportunities by submitting grant proposals and advocating for legislation of programs for people with developmental disabilities.

Environmental Factors Topic 2:Leadership: The Honorable Felix P. Camacho, Governor of Guam, supports the close collaboration of the GDDC and the DISID, to lead Guam's systems change process for the island's disabilities programs and services system. The Governor has called for maximum cooperation from the heads and personnel of the Departments of Public Health and Social Services (DPHSS) and Mental Health and Substance Abuse (DMHSA), and the Guam Housing and Urban Renewal Authority (GHURA). The Governor has also instructed the Department of Administration (DOA) and its Government Services Agency (GSA), and the Department of Revenue and Taxation and the Bureau of Budget and Management Research (BBMR) to provide administrative and logistical support as necessary for the successful implementation of any future systems changes. The next five years will continue to see the Guam DD Council working closely with the Office of the Governor, to continue the necessary rapport throughout the Governor's Cabinet to help eliminate any potential barriers that may prevent the Council from meeting its state plan's projected goals and objectives.

Environmental Factors Topic 3: Access to Resources: Guam, which is situated in the vast expanse of the Pacific Ocean in the Micronesia region, is approximately 5,800 miles from the continental United States. Officially, Guam is an unincorporated territory of the United States. Yet its distance from the United States leaves it with little access to the skill resources, implementation models and technology available to mainland states. To date, this lack of access has proven to be a barrier to permanent systems change. The lack of automation on Guam results in a dearth of information on long-term care services, costs and clients. Without this valuable information, Guam cannot design accurate long-term care budgets and cannot apply for increased federal funding to meet current service demand. Guam's current level of automation reflects it distance from technological resources and its funding barriers. Most long-term care documentation and eligibility processing is still paper-based. Technological infrastructure will need to be put into place and the technological skills to maintain that infrastructure will need to be transferred from off-island to local experts.

Environmental Factors Topic 4: Impact of the Compacts of Free Association on Guam: The nations included in the Compacts are the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI), and the Republic of Palau. Compact immigration provisions authorizes unrestricted immigration into the United States, its territories and possessions, enabling citizens of these nations to enter into, lawfully engage in occupations, and establish residence as non-immigrant aliens. As a result, the increased demands have adversely impacted Guam's economy of providing health care, education, job training and public assistance. Tracking the numbers of immigrant consumers relocating to Guam and their distinct types of disabilities has yet to be done.

#### C. The State Services System(s)

Service System(s) Topic 1: Vocational Rehabilitation Programs: Empowerment elicits change, and nothing provides more pride to a person than the sense of accomplishment they receive by contributing to the success of an organization through their own hard work. The Guam Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics announced in March 2004 that the unemployment rate was 7.7 percent, a decrease of 3.7 percentage points from the 11.4 percent reported in March 2002. However, regular employment for Guam's consumers is still a serious need. Consumers in attendance during a workshop sponsored by GDDC in April 2006, expressed their great concern for the lack of vocational rehabilitation opportunities. They expressed their true desire to work, but there is no effective system in place through which they can be assisted to either educational or vocational opportunities. The GDDC will continue its representation in the State Rehabilitation Council (SRC) as well as partner with DISID to work with the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation and other organizations that help connect ambitious people ready to work with organizations or businesses that recognize the benefits of hiring people with disabilities.

Service Systems(s) Topic 2: Funding Obstacles: Guam's federal funding structure leaves it without access to entitlement funds. Funding for long-term care beyond Guam's block grant cap must come from internal financial resources. Guam relies heavily on tourism as the backbone of its economy. Consequently, the previous downturn in the tourist industry has created financial difficulties that permeate all sectors of the island, a situation that is only just now improving. Over the past years, private sector business closures, including companies with a long history of operations, have

been a source of great concern. Downsizing and closure of the U.S. Naval Air Station have also had an adverse effect on the island. Additionally, the military has established a separate Department of Defense Education system that has removed students, education professionals, and money from the local economy. This year, with the recently announced relocation of thousands of U.S. Marines from Okinawa, Japan, and their families into Guam with funding for infrastructure to follow, brings some demands on Guam's healthcare and disability care systems. The most difficult obstacle Guam currently faces is the overall shortage of Medicaid dollars. This shortage results in inadequate services, both institutional and home and community-based. Guam has only two Adult Day Centers, is severely under-bedded, and has no formal program for providing personal assistance services for individuals who qualify for home- and community-based supports. This combination of deficits results in costly and unwarranted institutional care, often off-island.

Service Systems Topic 3: Personal Care Attendant (PCA) Program: There is presently no personal care attendant (PCA) program available in Guam to aid those individuals who are often confronted with daily challenges and obstacles when attempting to accomplish their civic and personal responsibilities, A significant number of individuals with disabilities have expressed their willingness to make time in their day-to-day activities to utilize the public transit system and tend to their desired activities, mostly at vehicle-commuting locations in and around the island; however, they are unable to attempt this type of activity without one-on-one assistance. In line with the need for a Personal Care Attendants program, there is also the lack of a funding and delivery mechanism for those services. Contributing to this problem is Guam's lack of technology infrastructure for operations and for collecting data about client needs, services, and costs.

Service Systems Topic 4: Transportation issues continue to be a great concern of the GDDC, partly because of inconsistency of services, and also because of the lack of an effective procedural management to ensure continuity and efficiency of operations. Presently, services are shared on a month-to-month basis by two capable transportation services providers as prescribed by a local court of law, while a settlement in contract services litigation is pending. Both vendors operate by their own distinct operational procedures, which often results in inconsistencies in scheduling, pickup, and ondemand operations, etc. The current transportation situation on island is far from meeting all standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the needs of consumers who are reliant on the public transit system as their only form of transportation. The Council will continue its involvement in the Transportation Commission and in the Mobility Planning Team to ensure that all aspects of transportation affecting our consumers are addressed, and that there is a viable and sustained transportation system in place to serve our growing number of consumers.

Service Systems Topic 5: Data Infrastructure: It is recognized that Guam has an increasing need for some information technology standardization to ensure that information might be shared to the degree appropriate. Several federal agencies (e.g., Departments of Justice and Human Services) have collaborated to create a National Information Exchange Model (NIEM) that the Guam Bureau of Information Technology will utilize as a model for Guam. Ultimately, Guam departments would link to a common data core. The computer database systems currently under development at the

DMHSA and the DISID, both appear aligned with the project specifications which the Guam Bureau of Information Technology requests. Along with these network developments, the individual agency websites for the GDDC and DISID will also be developed for broader dissemination of information through the Guam GetCare System, which is scheduled to be launched January 1, 2007, under an Aging and Disabilities Resource Center (ADRC) grant.

Service Systems Topic 6: Development/Enhancement of Self-Directed Service Delivery System. GDDC and DISID will continue to pursue a Systems Transformation Grant to expand Guam's current Individualized Budgeting pilot program into a territory-wide program. Strategies for expansion include creating a Personal Assistance Services Center, training service counselors, implementing Individualized Budgeting information systems, and transitioning from an Individualized Budgeting pilot project to a sustainable, island-wide Individualized Budgeting program. Guam obviously has a significant need for technological innovation but possesses few funding avenues for information systems transformation. This system transformation grant, will also enable Guam to build an infrastructure to increase consumer choice and control, improve service delivery and significantly increase local skill resources. Specifically, the project will enhance:

- <u>consumer access</u> to care through the expansion of the ADRC Online Resource Directory and one-stop shopping information tools
- <u>consumer direction</u> of care through consumer-accessible Individualized Budgeting Plans and Consumer Health Profiles containing assessment, service scheduling and cost information
- <u>funding/policy development</u> using demographic, service and cost data to form a permanent long-term care data warehouse to study of long-term care costs and outcomes
- D. Community Services and Opportunities: On November 6, 2001, three individuals with disabilities in Guam filed a civil lawsuit against the Government leading to the issuance of a Permanent Injunction against the Governor of Guam and the Directors of the Department of Integrated Services for Individuals with Disabilities (DISID) and Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse (DMHSA), in their respective capacities based on the Olmstead Act of 1999. The Permanent Injunction is essentially an outline for the Government of Guam to come into compliance with providing a Comprehensive Implementation Plan and Minimum Care Requirements, a System of Implementing a Waiting List, and Interdepartmental Policies and Procedures on Changes in Community Placement, Grievance Procedures, and Appeals Process for those with mental illnesses and developmental disabilities. A lot of effort is presently being focused community-wide toward meeting the requirements of the permanent injunction and in securing systems to prevent recurrence of such infractions.

Waiting Lists: The Guam DD Council in collaboration with DISID has researched the rebalancing of funding efforts between institutions and community-based services. There are waiting lists for almost every program area affecting individuals with developmental disabilities on Guam. There are hundreds of persons waiting to be served, many for the first time, and many more who fall under the category of "underserved."

F. Unserved and Underserved Groups: A large number of families in Guam that have a family member with a developmental disability are either unserved or underserved, regardless of race or ethnicity.

**SECTION V: ASSURANCES** 

#### A. USE OF COUNCIL FUNDS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures the following:

- 1. That not less than 70 percent of such funds will be expended for activities related to the goals described in paragraph (4);
- That such funds will contribute to the achievement of the purpose of this subtitle in various political subdivisions of the Territory;
- That such funds will be used to supplement, and not supplant, the non-Federal funds that would otherwise be made available for the purpose for which the funds paid under section 122 are provided;
- That such funds will be used to complement and augment rather than duplicate or replace services for individuals with developmental disabilities and their families who are eligible for federal assistance under other State programs;
- That Part of the funds will be made available by the Territory to public or private entities;
- 6. That at the request of the Territory, a portion of such funds provided to the Territory under this subtitle for any fiscal year shall be available to pay up to ½ (or the entire amount if the Council is the designated State agency) of the expenditures found to be necessary by the Secretary for the proper and efficient exercise of the functions of the designated State agency, except that not more than 5 percent of such funds provided to the Territory for any fiscal year, or \$50,000, whichever is less, shall be made available for total expenditures for such purpose by the designated State agency; and
- 7. That not more than 20 percent of such funds will be allocated to the designated State agency for service demonstrations by such agency that:
  - a. contribute to the achievement of the purpose of this subtitle; and
  - b. are explicitly authorized by the council.

#### B. STATE FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that there will be reasonable State financial participation in the cost of carrying out the plan.

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#### C. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that no member of such Council will cast a vote on any matter that would provide direct financial benefit to the member or otherwise give the appearance of a conflict of interest.

#### D. URBAN AND RURAL POVERTY AREAS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that special financial and technical assistance will be given to organizations that provide community services, individualized supports, and other forms of assistance to individuals with developmental disabilities who live in areas designated as urban or rural poverty areas.

#### E. PROGRAM ACCESSIBILITY STANDARDS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that programs, projects, and activities funded under the plan, and the buildings in which such programs, projects, and activities are operated, will meet standards prescribed by the Secretary in regulations and all applicable Federal and State accessibility standards, including accessibility requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.), section 508 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794d), and the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601 et seq.)

#### F. INDIVIDUALIZED SERVICES

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that any direct services provided to individuals with developmental disabilities and funded under the plan will be provided in an individualized manner, consistent with the unique strengths, resources, priorities, concerns, abilities, and capabilities of such individual.

#### G. HUMAN RIGHTS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the human rights of the individuals with developmental disabilities (especially individuals without familial protection) who are receiving services under programs assisted under this subtitle will be protected consistent with section 109 (relating to rights of individuals with developmental disabilities).

#### H. MINORITY PARTICIPATION

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the Territory has taken affirmative steps to assure that participation in programs funded under this subtitle is geographically representative of the Territory, and reflects the diversity of the Territory with respect to race and ethnicity.

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#### EMPLOYEE PROTECTIONS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that fair and equitable arrangements (as determined by the Secretary after consultation with the Secretary of Labor) will be provided to protect the interests of employees affected by actions taken under the plan to provide community living activities, including arrangements designed to preserve employees rights and benefits and provide training and retraining of such employees where necessary, and arrangements under which maximum efforts will be made to guarantee the employment of such employees.

#### J. STAFF ASSSIGNMENTS

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the staff and other personnel of the Council, while working for the Council, will be responsible solely for assisting the Council in carrying out the duties of the Council under this subtitle and will not be assigned duties by the designated State agency, or any other agency, office, or entity of the Territory.

#### K. NONINTERFERENCE

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the designated State agency, and any other agency, office, or entity of the Territory, will not interfere with the advocacy, capacity building, and systemic change with activities, budget, personnel, State plan development, or plan implementation of the Council, except that the designated State agency shall have the authority necessary to carry out the responsibilities described in section 125(d)(3).

#### L. STATE QUALITY ASSURANCE

The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the Council will participate in the planning, design or redesign, and monitoring of State quality assurance systems that affect individuals with developmental disabilities.

#### M. OTHER ASSURANCES

- The Territory of Guam hereby assures that it will comply with all applicable Federal statues and regulations in effect during the time that the Territory of Guam is receiving formula grant funding.
- The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the human rights of the individuals with developmental disabilities will be protected consistent with section 110 of the Act (52 U.S.C. 6009).

- The Territory of Guam hereby assures that buildings used in connection with activities assisted under the Plan must meet all applicable provisions of Federal and State laws pertaining to accessibility, fire, health and safety standards.
- 4. The Territory of Guam hereby assures that the Territory's Developmental Disabilities Council shall follow the requirements of section 125(c)(8), (9) and (10) of the Act regarding budgeting, staff hiring and supervision and staff assignment. Budget expenditures must be consistent with applicable Guam laws and policies regarding grants and contracts and proper accounting and bookkeeping practices and procedures. In relation to staff hiring, the clause "consistent with state law" in section 125(c)(9) means that the hiring of Territory's Developmental Disabilities Council staff must be done in accordance with the Territory's personnel policies and procedures except that the Territory of Guam shall not apply hiring freezes, reductions in force, prohibitions on travel, or other policies to the staff of the Council, to the extent that such policies would impact staff or functions funded with Federal funds, or would prevent the Council from carrying out its functions under the Act.

GDDC has facilitated data collection and dissemination activities such as the Policy Maker and Family Supports Forums. A Consumer Workshop also gathered services providers and consumers to discuss issues, raise concerns and make recommendations about Guam's service delivery systems. GDDC evaluated its activities over the past years and reviewed public comments from events at which systemic problems were indicated and potential areas of emphasis were identified. Along with results of a World Café model, public input and two subsequent General Membership Working Sessions, GDDC identified more clearly where it should be headed in the next five years. GDDC released the Draft State Plan for public comments from June 21 to August 4, 2006. Public input was reviewed and incorporated into the State Plan. The areas of emphasis and goals and objectives listed in this state plan are those which GDDC will use to advocate and work for improving Guam's support services deliver systems.
