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INTRODUCTION

BACKGROUND

The Guam Uniform Crime Reporting (U.C.R.) Program is an island wide cooperative effort of local law enforcement agencies voluntarily reporting data on crime brought to their attention. The daily and monthly contributions of Guam's law enforcement agencies represents the initial step in establishing an efficient island-wide Criminal Justice Information System (C.J.I.S.). Ideally, the U.C.R. data will eventually merge with that of the other major components of the criminal justice system (i.e., prosecutors courts, corrections) to form an integrated system for the exchange of vital management information. The availability of such data will allow for the provision of complete and timely criminal histories of offenders and their progress through the criminal justice system.

Since January 1970, the Guam Police have administered the program as an island-wide uniform method of collecting statistics on crime as it is reported to law enforcement and producing a reliable set of criminal statistics for use in law enforcement administration, operation and management. Additionally, Guam's statistics are forwarded annually to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the annual Crime in the U.S. Report.

Over the years the U.C.R. data has become one of Guam's and America's leading social indicators. Guam's citizens look to U.C.R. as the primary information source on the nature and extent of crime, while criminologist, sociologists, legislators, state and local planners, the media and academicians use the statistics for wide and varied research and planning purposes.

CRIME FACTORS

Statistics gathered under the Uniform Crime Reporting Program are submitted by the law enforcement agencies of Guam and used to depict the picture of crimes island wide. In order to draw a fair conclusion of statistics, it is important to instill an awareness of the factors which influence the resulting crime statistics.

These crimes influencing factors are present to some degree in every community, and their presence affects in varying degrees the crime developments of the community. Comparison of crime figures between communities should not be made without first considering the individual factors present in each community.

The following circumstances are some of the conditions which will, by type and volume, affect the crime that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the surrounding area of which it is a part.
- Compositions of the population with reference age, sex and race.
- Policies of prosecuting officials and the courts.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.

- Economic conditions, including median income and job availability.
- Attitudes of the public toward participation and reporting crimes.
- Educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.

The main goal of this program is to identify crimes and related problems. The statistics in this publication should not be used to measure or evaluate the workloads and results of the individual contributing departments. While most police agencies are collectively thought of as crime fighting units, considerable independent research shows only a small portion of the workload of many departments is spent fighting crime. Because of other assigned duties, the peculiar cycle of crime and clearances, and the different community factors that normally affect crime statistics, no conclusions on individual departments should be reached without consulting their in-house duties and records.

PURPOSE OF UNIFORM CRIME REPORT (UCR)

The fundamental objective of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program is to produce a reliable set of criminal statistics on a local, state and national basis for use in law enforcement administration, operation and management. This compiled data is also intended for the use of other professionals and scholars who have an interest in the crime problem, and just as important as a reference source for the general public as an indicator of the crime factor in our society.

The objectives of Guam's Uniform Crime Reporting Program are:

- Inform the governor, legislature, other governmental officials and the public as to the nature of the crime problem in Guam - its magnitude and its trends.
- Provide law enforcement administrators with criminal statistics for administrative and operational use.
- Determine who commits crimes by age, sex, and race, in order to find the proper focus for crime prevention and enforcement.

- 4. Provide proper base data and statistics to:
 - Measure the workload and effectiveness of Guam's Criminal Justice System.
 - Improve the efficiency, effectiveness and performance of criminal justice agencies.
 - Measure the effects of prevention and deterrence programs.
 - d. Assist in the assessment of social and other causes of crime for he development of theories of criminal behavior.

CRIME INDEX

The offenses of murder, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, motor-

vehicle theft and arson are used to establish an index in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program. They measure the trend and distribution of crime in the United States and, more significantly, within the geographic regions of contributing entities such as Guam. These crimes are counted by law enforcement agencies as they become known and reported on a monthly basis. The crime index offenses were selected as a measuring device because, as a group, they represent the most common crime problems. They are all serious crimes, either by their very nature or due to the volume and frequency in which they occur.

The offenses of murder, forcible rape, aggravated assault and robbery make up the violent crime category. The offenses of burglary, larceny-theft, motor vehicle theft and arson make up the property crime category.

The total number of criminal acts that occur is unknown, but those that are reported to the police provide the first means of a count. Not all crimes come readily to the attention of the police; not all crimes are of sufficient importance to be significant in an index; and not all important crimes occur with enough regularity to be meaningful in an index. With these considerations in mind, and with all state and national reporting jurisdictions using uniform reporting procedures, the above crimes were selected as group to furnish an abbreviated and convenient measure of the crime problem.

The crime counts used in the Crime Index and set forth in this publication are based on actual offenses established and determined by police investigation. When a law enforcement agency receives a complaint of a criminal matter and the follow-up investigation discloses no crime occurred, it is "unfounded". These "unfounded" complaints are eliminated from the actual crime counts.

UNIFORM CRIME OFFENSES

Offenses in the Uniform Crime Reporting are divided into two groups designated as Index Offenses and Non-Index Offenses:

A. UCR INDEX OFFENSES

- 1. Criminal Homicide A. Murder and non-negligent manslaughter: All willful felonious homicide as distinguished from death caused by negligence. Excluded are suicides, attempt to kill, assault to kill, accidental deaths, and justifiable homicides. Justifiable homicides are limited to: 1.) The killing of a person by a law enforcement officer in the line of duty; and 2.) The killing of a person in the act of committing a felony by a private citizen. B. Manslaughter by negligence: the killing of another person through gross negligence is of some individual other than the victim.
- Rape The carnal knowledge of a female by force or coercion. Included are rapes by force and attempts for assaults to rape and attempted rapes.
- Robbery Stealing or taking anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.
- 4. Aggravated Assault -Assault with intent to kill or for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury or shooting, cutting, stabbing, maiming, poisoning, scalding or by the use of acids, explosives or other means. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. Simple assaults are excluded.
- 5. **Burglary** Breaking or entering. The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. Attempt forcible entry is included.

- 6. Larceny-Theft (Exclude Motor Vehicle Theft) The unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the possession or constructive possession of another. Examples are thefts of bicycles or automobiles accessories, shoplifting, pocket-picking, or the stealing of any property or article which is not taken by force and violence or by fraud. Attempted larcenies are included. Embezzlement, "con" games, forgery, worthless checks, etc...are excluded.
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. A motor vehicle is self- propelled and runs on the surface and not on rails. Specifically excluded from the category are motorboats, construction equipment, airplanes and framing equipment.
- Arson Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property or another, etc.

B. NON-INDEX OFFENSES

- Other assaults (Simple) Assaults and attempted assaults where no weapon is used and which do not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.
- Forgery and counterfeiting Making, altering, or possessing, with intent to defraud, anything false in the semblance of that which is true. Attempts are included.
- Fraud Fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. Included are confidence games and bad checks, except forgeries and counterfeiting.
- Embezzlement Misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.
- Stolen property Buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, including attempts.
- Vandalism Willful or malicious destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of any public or private property, real or personal, without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.
- 15. Weapons; carrying, possessing, etc., All violations of regulations or statutes controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers. Attempts are Included.
- 16. Prostitution and commercialized vice Sex offenses of a commercialized nature, such as prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, or transporting women for immoral purposes. Attempts are included.
- Sex offenses (except forcible rape, prostitution, and commercialized vice) - Statutory rape and offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like. Attempts are included.
- 18. **Drug abuse violations.** Stat and local offenses relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, and manufacturing of narcotic drugs.
- 19. **Gambling** Promoting, permitting, or engaging in illegal gambling.

- 20. Offenses against the family and children Non-support, neglect, desertion, or abuse of family and children.
- Driving under the Influence Driving or operating any vehicle or common carrier while drunk or under the influence of liquor or narcotics.
- Liquor Laws State of local liquor law violations, except "drunkenness" and "driving under the influence."
- 23. **Drunkenness** Offense relating to drunkenness or intoxication. Excluded is "driving under the influence."
- Disorderly Conduct Breach of Peace.
- Vagrancy Vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc...
- All other offenses -All violations of state or local laws, except those listed above and traffic offenses.
- Suspicion No specific offense; suspect released without formal charges being placed.
- Curfew and loitering laws (person under the age of 18) offenses
 relating to violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances where such
 laws exists.
- Runaways (persons under age 18) Limited to juveniles taken into protective custody under provisions of local statutes.

REPORTING PROCEDURE

Under Guam's Uniform Reporting Program, law enforcement agencies are required to report the number of known index crime offenses from their records of complaints, investigations and arrests.

On a daily, monthly, basis law enforcement agencies report the number of offenses that are known to them during the day and month in the following crime categories:

- 1. Criminal Homicide
- Forcible Rape
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Assault
- 5. Burglary
- 6. Larceny-Theft
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft
- 8. Arson

The count of offenses taken from the record of complaints of crime received by law enforcement

agencies. This information comes from victims, witnesses, other sources, or discovered by officers during their own operation. Whenever complaints of crime are determined though investigation to be unfounded or false, they are eliminated from the actual count. The number of "actual offenses known" in these crime categories are reported without regard for whether or not anyone is arrested for the crime; the stolen property is recovered; prosecution is undertaken; or any other restrictive consideration is in effect. Law enforcement agencies on a monthly basis report the total number of these reported crimes which they clear, either by arrests or exceptional means. A separate count of crimes cleared which involve only persons under the age of 18 is shown. The number of law enforcement officers killed or assaulted, family violence, hate crimes and type of property stolen and recovered during the month are also reported. Arrests are reported monthly for all criminal acts, except traffic violations, by crime category and includes the age, sex and race of each person arrested.

CRIME RATE

To compute the crime rate, divide the community population by 1,000 and divide the number of offenses in each class by that number. The answer is the number of offenses per 1,000 and is the crime rate for that particular offense.

Example:

a.) Population - 136,226

b.) Index Offenses total - 4,814

Divide: 136,226 by 1,000 = 136.2 Divide: 4,814 by 136.226 = 35.3%

The crime rate for Index Offenses is 35.3% per 1,000 inhabitants. This same computation can be used to compute for arrests rates per 1,000.

CLEARANCE RATE

The percentage of crimes cleared is obtained by dividing the number of offenses cleared by the number of offenses known. This answer is then multiplied by 100.

Example:

- a.) Number of cleared offenses 1,941
- b.) Number of actual offenses 4,814

Divide: 1,941 by 4,814 = 0.403 Multiply: 0.403 by 100 = 40.3%

The clearance rate for index offenses is 40.3%.

CRIME TREND DATA

Local agencies can compute crime trends for a given offense for their individual agency for a particular period of time.

Example:

a.) Burglaries reported in 1990 -925b.) Burglaries reported in 1991 -774

Subtract: 925 - 774 = 151 Divide: 151 by 925 = 0.163

Multiply: $0.163 \times 100 = 16.3\%$

Always divide the difference by the total in the earlier time period keeping note as to whether there was a decrease (-) or increase (+) when subtracting.

The trend is a 16.3% decrease (-16.3%) in 1991 as compared to 1990.

POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

Police employee rates are express as a number of employees per 1,000 inhabitants of your city or town. To compute this rate, divide the population by 1,000 and divide the number of employees in the department by this number.

Example:

- a.) This jurisdiction's population 136,226
- b.) The agency's number of employees 422

Divide: 136,226 by 1,000 = 136.226 Divide: 422 by 136.226 = 3.1%

The employee rate is 3.1% employee per 1,000 habitants.


















ANNUAL TREND OF STOLEN MOTOR VEHICLES 1987-1998





Juvenile Dispositions 1995-1998

The Department's Uniform Crime Reporting Program requires the collection of police disposition of juveniles. When an adult is arrested he/she is usually held for prosecution for some charge or is released for future handling in court. This is not necessarily the case with juvenile. Depending on the seriousness of the offense and the juvenile's prior record, many are warned by the police and released to parents or guardians. In certain instances, juveniles are referred to welfare agencies, to other police agencies, or in the case of serious offenders, to criminal or adult court by wavier of the juvenile court.

The word "arrest" as it applies to juveniles is intended to mean the handling of all juveniles who have committed a crime and are taken into custody under such circumstances that were the juvenile an adult, an arrest would have been made. Police "contacts" with juveniles where no offense has been committed are not counted as arrests. Instances where a juvenile is taken into custody for his/her protection, such as neglect cases, and where no crime is committed are not counted as arrests.




DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION TOTAL



DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION HOMICIDE



DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION AGGRAVATED ASSAULT




DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION SIMPLE ASSAULT


DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION RAPE


DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION **SEX OFFENSES**



DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION DISORDERLY CONDUCT




DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION WEAPONS USED





DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION EXTENT OF INJURY





DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION INVOLVEMENT OF CHILDREN





DOMESTIC/FAMILY VIOLENCE PERCENT DISTRIBUTION RELATIONSHIP OF OFFENDER TO VICTIM









ARREST BY DRUG TYPES TEN-YEAR TREND 1970- 1980





ARREST BY DRUG TYPES EIGHTEEN - YEAR TREND 1980-1998




ARRESTS BY DRUG TYPES PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION


ARRESTS BY DRUG TYPES PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION 1990




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ARRESTS BY DRUG VIOLATIONS PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION






ARRESTS BY DRUG VIOLATIONS PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION 1990




DRUG ARRESTS BY AGE STATUS PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION 1990 - 1998




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DRUG/ALCOHOL – RELATED INDEX CRIMES PERCENTAGE DISTRIBUTION 1990 - 1998
