





GUAM ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

Summary

The outlook for Fiscal Year 2009 is a continuation of the growth path established over the last five consecutive years as measured by gross sales receipts. The expansion in FY 2003 through FY 2005 was largely due to the recovery of tourism from the depressed levels following the events of September 11, 2001 and SARS which severely impacted tourist arrivals as well as reconstruction efforts following the 2002 Typhoon Pongsona. The impetus for the growth in Fiscal Years 2006 – 2009 is being driven primarily by increasing construction activity levels and steady visitor arrivals with increasing hotel expenditures.

The total dollar amount of the combined construction permitted by the Department of Public Works and contracted by the federal government has risen from \$159 million in FY 2004 to \$428 million in FY 2007. The 2008 National Defense Authorization Act passed by the House of Representatives and the Senate is expected to be signed into law by the President. It authorizes a total of \$290.7 million in construction expenditures for military installations on Guam --- an increase of nearly \$100 million from last year. Total construction projects scheduled for commencement in 2008 exceed \$500 million. Construction industry employment growth has not kept pace with the increase in contracts in the last two years, perhaps indicating a growing backlog of projects. Continued increases in construction and possible acceleration in the growth of construction related employment and revenues are likely. The September 2007 Current Employment Report shows a 35 percent increase in construction employment in the latest one year period. This indicates increased construction activities underway.

Construction activities are primarily driven by a number of Department of Defense projects designed to strengthen Guam's defense infrastructure, as well as Government of Guam capital improvements in infrastructure and private housing projects. Limited construction in hotels, apartments, and commercial buildings is occurring due to substantial existing vacant capacity. Hotel construction is characterized by major renovation and modest expansion to upgrade facilities, some under new ownership or management, to cater to current trends and demands in the visitor industry, such as enhanced wedding and spa facilities.

While the percentage increase in construction has been dramatic, the percentage change in the total employment is less dramatic as construction represents less than 10 percent of total employment on Guam. Total employment on Guam increased a more restrained 2.7 percent over the latest one year period and average hourly earnings of private sector non-supervisory workers increased 3 percent.

The visitor sector has remained essentially static for the last several years in terms of arrivals, and no dramatic change in the trend has been forecast. The revenue picture in this



sector is better, however. Hotel occupancy tax collections have risen 5.6 percent in the latest year and 32.6 percent over the latest five year period. The rise in occupancy taxes represents higher expenditures in hotels due to a combination of factors including inflation and rising prices passed on in higher room rates, stronger demand and upgraded facilities. The higher average room rates are explained, in part, by better accommodations rather than just rate increases for existing services.

The pace of economic growth is expected to remain fairly steady in FY 2009 and will to some extent be affected by the scheduling and timing of the completion of various construction projects.

In making year-to-year economic and revenue comparisons, it is important to consider extraordinary items which occurred in FY 2007 and FY 2008 which can be considered one-time events. These include:

- » FY 2007 closed with extraordinary receipt of \$21 million in additional Section 30 reimbursement
- » Tax Amnesty Program realized an additional \$9 million in FY 2007
- » FY 2008 is being buoyed with the disbursement of \$18 million in bond-funded tax refunds and \$14 million in bond funded Cost of Living Allowance (COLA) payments --- neither of these expansionary stimuli are anticipated for FY 2009

- » Increases in fees, etc. boosted FY 2007 revenues and increased percentage year-to-year change --- continuation of the fees would not result in future year-to-year percentage increases
- » FY 2008 kicked off with a boost to employment with two sizeable employers, Home Depot and Ruby Tuesday opening their doors in the first quarter



The construction growth trend of the 1990's is different from the current ones in one key aspect. The development of the 1990's created construction jobs and following construction, substantial resident job creation occurred with the opening of each hotel, golf course, restaurant the related services and establishments associated with tourism. The construction projects of the 1990's were primarily the creation of business establishments and the resultant creation of permanent jobs for resident. The construction of today is primarily but not exclusively associated with improvement in capital assets,

housing and upgrading of existing infrastructure and business facilities. Completion of these projects will generate a more limited number of jobs to operate the improved facilities and infrastructure.

Improved infrastructure, both defense and civilian infrastructure, are important in the long-term to support economic expansion but does not generate substantial number of jobs immediately as do new major business openings such as hotels and retail stores. Additionally, a substantial component of the increased employment in the construction labor force is comprised of foreign workers reducing the positive impact on local employment and expenditure of income from the expansion in this industry. Therefore, large construction projects occurring in the near future will not generate the large and permanent employment and associated payroll revenue growth as in the 1990's.

Moderate economic expansion is expected to continue, but not a boom, prior to the anticipated construction in 2010 to accommodate relocation of the Marines from Okinawa. As always, there are risks associated with a sometimes volatile tourist industry and the economy in general, including fuel price escalation, health issues, typhoons and unanticipated international political, economic and security issues, which could impact the positive outlook for the years ahead.

Some of the uncertainties in the Economic Outlook for FY 2008 include court decisions on the Cost of Living, Earned Income Tax Credit and bond litigation in the U.S. Supreme Court have been resolved; other remain unresolved, including closure of the Ordot dump and opening a new sanitary landfill as well as addressing the growing Government of Guam deficits and

expectations for improved services and employee compensation adjustments. How and when these issues are addressed may have additional economic impacts as well.

Age_Sex Structure

The age-sex structure is the composition of a population as determined by the number or proportion of males and females in each age category. The age_sex structure of a population is the cumulative result of past trends in fertility, mortality, and migration. Information on age_sex composition is essential for the description and analysis of many other types of demographic data. See also *Population Pyramid*.

Average

The average is the amount obtained by dividing the aggregate or total of a particular variable in the statistical universe by the number of units in that universe.

 $_{\mathbf{B}}$

Bankruptcy

A legal procedure for dealing with debt problems of individuals and businesses. These procedures are covered under Title 11 of the United States Code (Bankruptcy Code). Bankruptcy laws help people who can no longer pay their creditors get a fresh start by liquidating their assets to pay their debts, or be creating a repayment plan. Bankruptcy laws also protect troubled businesses and provide for orderly distributions to business creditors through reorganization or liquidation.

Birth

A birth (live birth) is the complete expulsion or extraction from is mother of a product of human conception, irrespective of the duration of the pregnancy, which, after such expulsion or extraction, breathes or shows any other evidence of life such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord or definite movement of the voluntary muscles, whether or not the umbilical cord has been cut or the placenta is attached.

Birth Rate

The birth rate is the number of live births per 1,000 population in a given year. It should not be confused with the growth rate. See also *Growth Rate*.

 \mathbf{C}

Census

A census is the canvassing of a given area, resulting in an enumeration of the entire population and often the compilation of other demographic, social, and economic information pertaining to that population at a specific time. See also *Survey*.

Census Designated Place

Census designated places (CDP) are delineated for each decennial census to provide census data for concentrations of population, housing, and commercial structures that are identifiable by name but are not within an incorporated place. CDP boundaries usually are defined in cooperation with state, local, and tribal officials. CDP boundaries may change from one decennial census to the next with changes in the settlement pattern; a CDP with the same name as in an earlier census does not necessarily have the same boundary. All places in Guam are CDPs.

Childbearing Years

Childbearing years is the reproductive age span of women, assumed for statistical purposes to be 15_44 or 15_49 years of age.

Civilian

A civilian is a person who is not in the armed forces, including dependent members of the armed forces.

Civilian Labor Force

The civilian labor force is all persons 16 years and older employed for pay or profit plus those who are unemployed but seeking work. See also *Employed*, *Unemployed*, and *Not in Labor Force*.

Cohort

A group of people sharing a common temporal demographic experience who are observed through time. For example, the birth cohort of 1900 is the people born in that year.

Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) measures the rate at which the prices of consumer goods and services are changing over time. In practice, most CPIs are calculated as weighted averages of the percentage price changes for a specified set, or "basket", of consumer products, the weights reflecting their relative importance in household consumption in some period. A monthly or quarterly price index compiled and published by an official statistical agency that measures changes in the prices of consumption goods and services acquired or used by households.

Crude Birth Rate

See Birth Rate.

Crude Death Rate

See Death Rate.

Crude Divorce Rate

See Divorce Rate.

Death

Death is the permanent loss of all evidence of life after a live birth has occurred.

Death Rate

The death rate is the number of deaths per 1,000 population in a given year.

Defined Benefit Plan

The Defined Benefit Plan provides for retirement, disability, and survivor benefits to members of the plan prior to October 1,1995 (all government employees are required to participate in the Defined Contribution Plan after October 1, 1995). Under the Defined Benefit Plan, retirement benefits are based on age and/or years of credited service and an average of the three (3) highest annual salaries received by a member during the years of credited service, or six thousand (\$6,000), whichever is greater.

Defined Contribution Plan

Created by Public Law 23-42:3, this plan provides an individual account retirement system for any person who is employed by the Government of Guam. This plan is a single-employer pension and is the only plan for all new employees whose employment commences on or after October 1, 1995.

Density

Population density and housing unit density are computed by dividing the total population or number of housing units within a geographic entity by the land area of that entity measured in square kilometers or square miles. Density is expressed as both "people (or housing units) per square kilometer" and "people (or housing units) per square mile" of land area.

Dependency Ratio

The ratio of the economically dependent part of the population to the productive part; arbitrarily defined as the ratio of the elderly (ages 65 and older) plus the young (under age 15) to the population in the working ages (ages 15_64).

Disability Status

Disability status was derived from answers to two Census questionnaire items. The first asked about the existence of the following long_lasting conditions: (a) blindness, deafness, or a severe vision or hearing impairment (sensory disability) and (b) a condition that substantially limits one or more basic physical activities, such as walking, climbing stairs, reaching, lifting, or carrying (physical disability) for the population 5 years old and over.

Disability status was also determined by asking if the individual had a physical, mental, or emotional condition lasting 6 months or more that made it difficult to perform activities in four categories: (a) learning, remembering, or concentrating (mental disability); (b) dressing, bathing, or getting around inside the home (self_care disability); (c) going outside the home alone to shop or visit a doctor's office (going outside the home disability); and (d) working at a job or business (employment disability). Individuals were classified as having a disability if any of the following three conditions were true: (1) they were 5 years old and over and had a response of "yes" to a sensory, physical, mental or self_care disability; (2) they were 16 years old and over and had a response of "yes" to going outside the home disability; or (3) they were 16 to 64 years old and had a response of "yes" to employment disability.

Divorce

A divorce is the legal termination of a marriage.

Divorce Rate

The divorce rate is the number of divorces per 1,000 population in a given year.

 $_{\mathbf{E}}$

Educational Attainment

The classification of people according to the level of education attained (the highest level of school completed or the highest degree received).

Election District

An election district is the official term for what is commonly called a "village"; there are the nineteen (19) election districts or villages on Guam.

Employed

All civilians 16 years old and over were classified as employed if they were "at work" or "with a job but not at work" during the reference week, including temporarily absent. See also *Unemployed* and *Not in Labor Force*.

Ethnic Origin

Ethnic origin refers to an individual's origin or descent, "roots," heritage, or place where the individual or his/her parents or ancestors were born. Respondents reported their ethnic group regardless of the number of generations removed from their place or origin. Responses to the ethnic origin or race question reflected the groups with which respondents identified and not necessarily the degree of attachment or association the individual had with the particular group(s). See also *Race*.

Ethnicity

The cultural practices, language, cuisine, and traditions — not biological or physical differences — used to distinguish groups of people.

_ F _

Family

A family includes a householder and one or more other people living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. All people in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family. A family household may contain people not related to the householder, but those people are not included as part of the householder's family in census tabulations. Thus, the number of family households is equal to the number of families, but family households may include more members than do families. A household can contain only one family for purposes of census tabulations. Not all households contain families since a household may be comprised of a group of unrelated people or of one person living alone.

Family Income

In compiling statistics on family income, the incomes of all members 15 years old and over related to the householder are summed and treated as a single amount.

Fertility

The data on fertility (also referred to as "children ever born") were derived from the answers to the Census question which asked women 15 years old and over—regardless of their marital status—how many babies they have ever had. Stillbirths, stepchildren, and adopted children were excluded from the number of children ever born. Data are most frequently presented in terms of the aggregate number of children ever born to women in specified population groups and in terms of the rate per 1,000 women.

Fetal Death

A fetal death is a death prior to the complete expulsion or extraction from its mother of a product of human conception, irrespective of the duration of the pregnancy; the death is indicated the fact that after such expulsion or extraction the fetus does not breathe or show any other evidence of life such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord, or definite movement of voluntary muscles.

Freely Associated States

The Freely Associated States (FAS) consists of the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI), and the Republic of Palau. Formerly a part of the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands (TTPI), they became independent nations in free association with the United States.

 \mathbf{G}

General Fertility Rate

The general fertility rate (GFR) is the number of live births per 1,000 women ages 15_44 or 15_49 years in a given year.

Gross Domestic Product

The gross domestic product (GDP) is the total market value of all the goods and services produced within a country in a given period of time.

Gross Reproduction Rate

The gross reproductive rate (GRR) is the average number of daughters that would be born alive to a woman (or group of women) during her lifetime if she passed through her childbearing years conforming to the age_specific fertility rates of a given year. See also *Net Reproduction Rate* and *Total Fertility Rate*.

Group Quarters

Group quarters is used to describe places in which people reside that are not considered "housing units," such as prisons, long-term care hospitals, military barracks, and dormitories. The group quarters population includes all people not living in households. Two general categories of people in group quarters are recognized:

- (1) the institutionalized population which includes people under formally authorized, supervised care or custody in institutions at the time of enumeration. Such people are classified as "patients or inmates" of an institution regardless of the availability of nursing or medical care, the length of stay, or the number of people in the institution. Generally, the institutionalized population is restricted to the institutional buildings and grounds (or must have passes or escorts to leave) and thus have limited interaction with the surrounding community. Also, they are generally under the care of trained staff who have responsibility for their safekeeping and supervision, and
- (2) the noninstitutionalized population which includes people who live in group quarters other than institutions. It also includes staff residing in military and nonmilitary group quarters on institutional grounds who provide formally authorized, supervised care or custody for the institutionalized population.

Growth Rate

The growth rate is a general expression of the number of people added to (or subtracted from) a population in a year due to natural increase and net migration expressed as a percentage of the population at the beginning of the time period.

Homeless

According to the Stewart B. McKinney Act, 42 U.S.C. § 11301, et seq. (1994), a person is considered homeless who "lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate night_time residence and; and... has a primary night time residency that is: (A) a supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations... (B) an institution that provides a temporary residence for individuals intended to be institutionalized, or (C) a public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings." 42 U.S.C. § 11302(a) The term "homeless individual does not include any individual imprisoned or otherwise detained pursuant to an Act of Congress or a state law." 42 U.S.C. § 11302(c).

Household

A household includes all of the people who occupy a housing unit. (People not living in households are classified as living in group quarters.) Separate living quarters are those in which the occupants live separately from any other people in the building and that have direct access from the outside of the building or through a common hall. The occupants may be a single family, one person living alone, two or more families living together, or any other group of related or unrelated people who share living quarters.

Household Income

Household income is the sum of all incomes of all members 15 years old and over of a household which are treated as a single amount.

Housing Unit

A housing unit is a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room occupied (or if vacant, intended for occupancy) as separate living quarters. See also *Tenure*.

HTSUSA

Acronym for *Harmonized Tariff Schedule for the United States Annotated*. The HTSUSA provides the applicable tariff rates and statistical categories for all merchandise imported into the United States. It is based on the international Harmonized System, the global system of nomenclature that is used to describe most world trade in goods.

Income

Income is the wages or revenue accruing from labor, business enterprise, or investments. See also *Household Income*, *Family Income*, *Individual Income*, *Mean Income*, *Median Income*, and *Per Capital Income*.

Individual Income

Income for individuals is obtained by summing the total income for each person.

Immigration

Immigration is the process of entering one country from another to take up permanent or semi-permanent residence.

Industry

Industry relates to the kind of business conducted by a person's employing organization described by its economic product or activity.

Infant Death

An infant death is a death occurring to an individual of less than one year of age

Infant Mortality Rate

The infant mortality rate is the number of deaths of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births in a given year.

 ${f L}$

Labor Force

The labor force is all persons employed for pay or profit plus those who are unemployed but seeking work. See also *Employed*, *Unemployed*, and *Not in Labor Force*.

Life Expectancy

Life expectancy is the average number of additional years a person could expect to live if current mortality trends were to continue for the rest of that person's life. It is most commonly cited as life expectancy at birth.

Marriage

A marriage is a social institution involving legal or religious sanction whereby a man and a woman are joined together for the purpose of founding a family unit (traditional).

Maternal Death

A maternal death is a death wherein the physician has designated a maternal condition as the underlying cause of death.

Mean

This measure represents an arithmetic average of a set of values. It is derived by dividing the sum (or aggregate) of a group of numerical items by the total number of items in that group.

Mean Age

The mathematical average age of all the members of a population.

Mean Income

Mean income is the amount obtained by dividing the aggregate income of a particular statistical universe by the number of units in that universe. Thus, mean household income is obtained by dividing total household income by the total number of households.

Median

The median divides a distribution into two equal parts: one_half of the cases falling below the median income and one_half above the median. This measure represents the middle value (if n is odd) or the average of the two middle values (if n is even) in an ordered list of n data values. The median divides the total frequency distribution into two equal parts: one_half of the cases falling below the median and one_half above the median.

Median Age

The age that divides a population into two numerically equal groups; that is, half the people are younger than this age and half are older.

Median Income The median divides the income distribution into two equal parts:

one_half of the cases falling below the median income and one_half above the median. For households and families, the median income is based on the distribution of the total number of households and families

including those with no income.

Migration The movement of people across a specified boundary for the purpose of

establishing a new or semi-permanent residence. Divided into international migration (migration between countries) and internal

migration (migration within a country).

Minor Civil Division Minor Civil Divisions (MCD) are the primary governmental or

administrative divisions of a first_order subdivision. On Guam, they are Guam's election districts (villages). The MCDs in Guam are geographic subdivisions of the first_order subdivision(s) and are not governmental

units.

Mortality Mortality is a general term for deaths as a component of population

change.

Natality is a general term for births as a component of population

change.

Natural Increase (Decrease) The surplus (or deficit) of births over deaths in a population in a given

time period.

Neonatal Death A neonatal death is death occurring to an individual of less than 28 days

of age.

Neonatal Mortality Rate The neonatal mortality rate is the number of deaths of infants under 28

days of age in a given year per 1,000 live births in that year.

Net Migration The net effect of immigration and emigration on an area's population in a

given time period, expressed as an increase or decrease.

Net Migration Rate The net effect of immigration and emigration on an area's population,

expressed as an increase or decrease per 1,000 population of the area in a

given year.

Net Reproduction Rate The net reproduction rate (NRR) is the average number of daughters that

would be born to a woman (or a group of women) if she passed through her lifetime conforming to the age_specific fertility and mortality rates of a given year. This rate is similar to the gross reproduction rate but takes into account that some women will die before completing their childbearing years. An NRR of one means that each generation of mothers is having exactly enough daughters to replace itself in the

population. See also Total Fertility Rate.

Not in Labor Force

All people 16 years old and over who are not classified as members of the labor force. This category consists mainly of students, individuals taking care of home or family, retired workers, seasonal workers enumerated in an off_season who were not looking for work, institutionalized people (all institutionalized people are placed in this category regardless of any work activities they may have done in the reference week), and people doing only incidental unpaid family work (fewer than 15 hours during the reference week). See also *Employed* and *Unemployed*.

Nuptiality

Nuptiality is the general term for the frequency, characteristics, and dissolution of marriages in a population.

Occupation

Occupation describes the kind of work a person does on the job or a position in the labor force..

Part I Offense

Part I Offenses is the first of two main groupings of Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) crime classifications consisting of eight offenses reported whether or not they involve arrests:

- 1. Criminal Homicide,
- 2. Forcible Rape
- 3. Robbery
- 4. Aggravated Assault
- 5. Burglary 6. Larceny_theft (except motor vehicle theft)
- 7. Motor Vehicle Theft
- 8. Arson

See also Part II Offences and Uniform Crime Report.

Part II Offense

Part II Offenses is the second of the two main Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR) groupings of crime classifications not already designated in Part I. Agencies are limited to reporting arrest information only for Part I offenses with the exception of simple assault.

Law enforcement agencies report to the FBI only arrest data involving the Part II crimes:

- 10. Forgery and Counterfeiting
- 11. Fraud
- 12. Embezzlement
- 13. Stolen Property: Buying, Receiving, Possessing
- 14. Vandalism

Per Capita Income

The per capita income is the amount obtained by dividing the aggregate

income of all individuals, including those without incomes, by the total

number of individuals.

Percentage This measure is calculated by taking the number of items in a group

possessing a characteristic of interest and dividing by the total number of

items in that group, and then multiplying by 100.

Permanent Resident A permanent resident is any person not a citizen of the United States who

is residing in the U.S. under legally recognized and lawfully recorded permanent residence as an immigrant (also known as "Permanent Resident Alien", "Lawful Permanent Resident," "Resident Alien Permit

Holder," and "Green Card Holder"). See also *Temporary Resident*.

Places, for the reporting of decennial census data for the Pacific Island

Areas, include census designated places (CDP) and incorporated places.

Population The total population of a country may comprise either all usual residents

of the country (de jure population) or all persons present in the country (de facto population) at the time of the census. For purposes of

international comparisons, the de facto definition is recommended.

Population Estimate Population estimates are approximations of current or past population of

an area at a given time, or its distribution or composition in absence of

complete enumeration.

Population Density The population density is the population per unit of land area; for

example, people per square mile or people per square kilometer of arable

land.

Population Projection Population projections are the computations of future changes in population numbers, given certain assumptions about future trends in the

rates of fertility, mortality, and migration. Demographers often issue low, medium, and high projections of the same population, based on different

assumptions of how these rates will change in the future.

Population Pyramid

A bar chart, arranged vertically, that shows the distribution of a population by age and sex. By convention, the younger ages are at the bottom, with males on the left and females on the right.

Poverty

Poverty is an economic and social condition for an individual, family, or household whose level of living in terms of food, housing, clothing, medical needs, and so on are determined to be below the community standard.

Following the Office of Management and Budget's (OMB) Statistical Policy Directive 14 (1978), the Census Bureau uses a set of money income thresholds designed in the 1960s that vary by family size and composition to determine who is poor. If a family's total income is less than that family's threshold, then that family, and every individual in it, is considered poor. The poverty thresholds do not vary geographically, but they are updated annually for inflation using the Consumer Price Index (CPI_U). The official poverty definition counts money income before taxes and does not include capital gains and noncash benefits (such as public housing, medicaid, and food stamps). Poverty is not defined for people in military barracks or institutional group quarters or for unrelated individuals under age 15 (such as foster children). They are excluded from the poverty universe — that is, they are considered neither as "poor" nor as "nonpoor."

Poverty Status

For the 2000 Census, the poverty status of families and unrelated individuals in 1999 was determined using 48 thresholds (income cutoffs) arranged in a two dimensional matrix. The matrix consists of family size (from 1 person to 9 or more people) cross_classified by presence and number of family members under 18 years old (from no children present to 8 or more children present). Unrelated individuals and 2_person families were further differentiated by the age of the reference person (RP) (under 65 years old and 65 years old and over).

To determine a person's poverty status, one compares the person's total family income with the poverty threshold appropriate for that person's family size and composition. If the total income of that person's family is less than the threshold appropriate for that family, then the person is considered poor, together with every member of his or her family. If a person is not living with anyone related by birth, marriage, or adoption, then the person's own income is compared with his or her poverty threshold.

Ouartile

Quartile is a measure that divides a distribution into four equal parts. The first quartile (or lower quartile) is the value that defines the upper limit of the lowest one_quarter of the cases. The second quartile is the median. The third quartile (or upper quartile) is defined as the upper limit of the lowest three quarters of cases in the distribution. Quartiles are presented for certain financial characteristics, such as housing value and contract rent. The distribution used to compute quartiles is the same as that used to compute medians for that variable.

Quintile

Quintile is a measure that divides a distribution into five equal parts on the basis of the ranked total incomes. Hence, the lowest quintile is the bottom 20 percent of the population or households; the highest quintile is the highest 20 percent on the same basis.

Race

The racial classification used by the Census Bureau adheres to the October 30, 1997, Federal Register Notice entitled "Revisions to the Standards for the Classification of Federal Data on Race and Ethnicity" issued by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). These standards govern the categorization of race in census data products. The OMB identified five minimum race categories (White, Black or African American, American Indian or Alaska Native, Asian, and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander). In addition to the five race groups, the OMB also states that respondents should be offered the option of selecting one or more races. See also *Ethnic Origin*.

Rate

A rate is a measure of occurrences in a given period of time divided by the possible number of occurrences during that period. Rates are sometimes presented as percentages.

Rate of Natural Increase (or Decrease)

The rate of natural increase (or decrease) measures the population increase (or decrease) in a given year due to a surplus (or deficit) of births over deaths, expressed as a percentage of the base population.

Ratio

A ratio is a measure of the relative size of one number to a second number expressed as the quotient of the first number divided by the second. For example, the sex ratio is calculated by dividing the total number of males by the total number of females, and then multiplying by 100.

Rural

See Urban and Rural.

Sex Ratio

The sex ratio is a measure derived by dividing the total number of males by the total number of females, and then multiplying by 100.

Survey

A survey is a canvass of selected persons or households in a population usually used to infer demographic characteristics or trends for a larger segment or all of the population. See also *Census*.

Temporary Resident

A temporary resident is a nonimmigrant alien who seeks temporary entry to the United States for a specific purpose. The alien must have a permanent residence abroad (for most classes of admission) and qualify for the nonimmigrant classification sought. The nonimmigrant classifications include: foreign government officials, visitors for business and for pleasure, aliens in transit through the United States, treaty traders and investors, students, international representatives, temporary workers and trainees, representatives of foreign information media, exchange visitors, fiancé(e)s of U.S. citizens, intracompany transferees, NATO officials, religious workers, and some others. Most nonimmigrants can be accompanied or joined by spouses and unmarried minor (or dependent) children. See also *Permanent Resident*.

Tenure

Tenure represents the condition or nature by which occupancy of a housing unit is held. All occupied housing units are classified as either owner occupied or renter occupied. A housing unit is owner occupied if the owner or co_owner lives in the unit even if it is mortgaged or not fully paid for. All occupied housing units that are not owner occupied, whether they are rented for cash rent or occupied without payment of cash rent, are classified as renter occupied.

Total Fertility Rate (TFR)

The total fertility rate is the average number of children that would be born alive to a woman (or group of women) during her lifetime if she were to pass through her childbearing years conforming to the age_specific fertility rates of a given year. This rate is sometimes stated as the number of children women are having today. See also *Gross Reproduction Rate* and *Net Reproduction Rate*.

Unemployed

All civilians 16 years old and over were classified as unemployed if they were neither "at work" nor "with a job but not at work" during the reference week, were looking for work during the last 4 weeks, and were available to start a job. Also included as unemployed were civilians 16 years old and over who: did not work at all during the reference week, were on temporary layoff from a job, had been informed that they would be recalled to work within the next 6 months or had been given a date to return to work, and were available to return to work during the reference week, except for temporary illness. See also *Employed* and *Not in Labor Force*.

Uniform Crime Report (UCR)

Uniform crime reporting is a collective effort on the part of city, county, state, tribal, and federal law enforcement agencies to present a nationwide view of crime. Agencies throughout the country participating in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program provide summarized

reports on eight Part I offenses known to law enforcement and reports on persons arrested. They also provide information about law enforcement officers killed and assaulted and on hate crime.

The UCR Program divides offenses into two groups—Part I and Part II. The Program collects data on all Part I offenses that become known to law enforcement whether or not they involve arrests. These crime totals are essential to measuring the level and scope of crimes occurring across the country. Part II offenses are all crime classifications other than those defined as Part I. The UCR Program collects arrest data for both Part I and Part II offenses. See also Part I Offenses and Part II Offenses.

Urban and Rural

The U.S. Census Bureau classifies as urban all territory, population, and housing units located within urbanized areas (UAs) and urban clusters (UCs). It delineates UA and UC boundaries to encompass densely settled territory, which generally consists of:

- A cluster of one or more block groups or census blocks each of which has a population density of at least 1,000 people per square mile at the time, and
- Surrounding block groups and census blocks each of which has a population density of at least 500 people per square mile at the time, and
- Less densely settled blocks that form enclaves or indentations, or are used to connect discontiguous areas with qualifying densities.

Rural consists of all territory, population, and housing units located outside of UAs and UCs. Geographic entities such as first_order subdivisions, minor civil divisions, and places often contain both urban and rural territory, population, and housing units.

The urban and rural classification applies to the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, and the Virgin Islands of the United States.

There are UCs in all the Pacific Island Areas, but only the Northern Mariana Islands has a UA (Saipan).

Urban Cluster (UC)

An urban cluster (UC) consists of densely settled territory that has at least 2,500 people but fewer than 50,000 people, except in Guam. By agreement with the Government of Guam, the U.S. Census Bureau recognizes Hagåtña as a UC rather than an urbanized area.

Urbanized Area (UA)

An urbanized area (UA) consists of densely settled territory that contains 50,000 or more people, except in Guam (see below). The U.S. Census Bureau delineates UAs to provide a better separation of urban and rural territory, population, and housing in the vicinity of large places.

Veterans Status


For Census data products, a civilian veteran is a person 18 years old and over who, at the time of the enumeration, had served on active duty in the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard in the past (even for a short time), but was not then on active duty, or who had served in the Merchant Marine during World War II. People who had served in the National Guard or Military Reserves were classified as veterans only if they had ever been called or ordered to active duty, not counting the 4 to 6 months for initial training or yearly summer camps. All other civilians 18 years old and over were classified as nonveterans.

Vital Statistics

Vital statistics is the collection of Demographic data on births, deaths, fetal deaths, marriages, divorces, and related events usually compiled through a registration system or other administrative record system.

STATE OF THE ISLAND ADDRESS

By The Honorable Felix P. Camacho Governor of Guam February 16, 2009

Before I begin, I wish to share with you a story that illustrates the power of perspective.

Nearly 39 years ago, our country faced a choice: return to the moon proving that democracy could lead in every facet of innovation, or stay bound to earth and demonstrate that we could not.

Failure to go to the moon back then meant the possibility of death, the loss of billions of dollars to a dream, and a crisis in American confidence. It would mean that although we planned for every eventuality, some circumstances would always be beyond our control.

As Apollo 13 slipped beyond the bounds of earth, the world watched in anxiety as one problem led to another. NASA's director stated, "This could be the worst disaster NASA has ever faced." Then, a tested voice belonging to a flight director Gene Kranz responded, "With all due respect, sir, I believe this is going to be our finest hour."

We, too, have numerous challenges to overcome. Yet, despite the heavy burden we bear, I believe Guam's finest hour lies ahead.

Speaker Won Pat; Justice Carbullido; Lieutenant Governor Cruz; former governors; members of the Consular Corps; Senators; Attorney General Limtiaco; Public Auditor Brooks; Chief Justice Torres; Archbishop Apuron and members of the clergy; Pastor Roy Burke; Justices and Judges; Mayors and Vice-Mayors; members of the elected boards and commissions; members of the military; Major General; Good Admiral French; General for AAFB; my wife, First Lady Joann Camacho; and my mother, former First Lady Lourdes Camacho.

Honored guests and my fellow Guamanians.

Before we ass the state of our island, I want to thank our men and women in the armed forces who continue to courageously defend our freedom. May our actions be worthy of their service.

Time and time again our people have been tested. We have withstood the rise and fall of financial markets, endured natural disasters and felt the atrocities of war. Now, we face a global economic crisis.

Yet, through these trying times, we recognize one abiding truth: we are resilient. Though we have been challenged, the People of Guam have and will continue to overcome adversity. Though we are tested, we are not broken.

We are confident in the promise of our future; we recognize and acknowledge that our challenges must not be met with confidence alone.

Last year, our nation's vulnerable economy gave way to a financial crisis not seen since the Great Depression. In the United States, we have witnessed the collapse of the real estate market

and long-standing financial institutions. Globally, we have witnessed climate change, an oil crisis, and the war on terror.

Though we are thousands of miles away, Guam's economy remains largely influenced by forces beyond our control, be we cannot let fear paralyze our ability to act. The ongoing march of history tells us that with every challenge, there is the opportunity for greatness.

As the years pass, we will be judged on how we have contributed to building a society worthy of our children and grandchildren. We must rise above politics and do what some think is impossible. This is the administration that brings resolution to many long-standing issues.

Today, I will share our vision for a new era on Guam, the goals we must achieve to get there, and the successes we have had to date. The difficult issues of the past have landed on our shoulders of myself and elected leaders and we are called upon to deal with them now. As leaders, we all share the responsibility of closing the Ordot Dump and opening a new landfill.

The decisions we make now will affect the health and safety of our people. Without the luxury of time, we must be clear, focused, and decisive. President John F. Kennedy said, "There are risks and costs to a program of action, but they are far less than the long-range risks and costs of comfortable inaction."

Just three days ago, the Federal District Court ordered the Government of Guam to pay one million dollars a week to our federal receiver. This obligation will jeopardize essential government services.

My most recent attempt to resolve this matter has been my transmittal of Bill #51, which outlines several options for direct or alternative financing. Members of the Guam Legislature, I implore you, pass Bill 51. May God bless you with courage and wisdom. With proper authorization, as Governor of Guam, I will bring closure to this issue.

I have also submitted my proposed Fiscal Year 2010 budget to the Legislature, reflecting a 2% increase in revenues from the previous year. This conservative budget demonstrates that our priorities continue to be the education of our youth, the health of our citizens, and the safety of all.

Projected revenues are expected to reach \$533 million. These funds will be used to continue vital government services, address urgent financial matters and reduce our deficit.

We remain optimistic about our long term economic outlook. While we must continue our work toward a more efficient and effective government, we must do all we can to achieve increased revenues by addressing the real issue. The Department of Revenue and Taxation will pursue those who escape assessment, under report, or fail to file tax returns: preventing the loss of

millions of dollars a year. Strict enforcement of our existing tax code, combined with aggressive collection of outstanding taxes, will result in increased revenues.

In the midst of challenges, we continue to invest in a robust infrastructure.

Over the past year, the Guam Waterworks Authority spent \$1 million to improve the Hagatna Wastewater Pump Station and Ugum Treatment Plant. Work has also begun on the Talofofo Wastewater Treatment Plant.

They have completed sewer outfalls for the Hagatna and Nothern Plants, improving our island's wastewater system. GWA also spent \$1.5 million to reduce our dependence on Navy water, providing Agat and Santa Rita residents with more reliable services.

In the past six months, the Department of Public Works has undertaken \$60 million worth of construction projects. It is their goal to issue out over \$20 million worth of construction projects every three months for the remaining time of this administration.

To help our island prepare for the Guam Buildup, DPW has secured \$3.8 million for an Environmental Impact Study from the Department of Defense; they have secured \$56 million in construction projects; and continue to aim for \$1.5 billion for future projects.

Through partnerships with private management contractors, the Guam Power Authority is working to alleviate the burden of higher fuel costs. GPA has saved ratepayers \$124 million over the past 5 years. To date, our base load generation capacity has increased to more than 98%: a marked improvement from the days of rolling power outages.

Though the Authority has become more efficient, we are still one-hundred percent dependent on fossil fuels for energy generation. Late last year the price of crude oil, as we all know, peaked at \$147 per barrel, while our people were paying more than \$4 per gallon at the pump. The high cost of fuel has affected private businesses, government agencies, and households. No one has been spared.

This is why GPA's efforts to pursue alternative energy are so important. We fully support the use of alternative energy and are determined to decrease our reliance on fossil fuels. We live on an island with abundant sunlight, steady winds, and flowing tides, and now we should take advantage of our natural blessings.

It has been determined that nearly 30 megawatts of potential wind energy may be harnessed on Guam to help offset our island's dependence on fossil fuels.

This year, GPA will issue a request for proposal to companies specializing in geothermal, solar and wind energy.

GPA continues to execute plans that prepare our island for economic growth. In the last year they made numerous infrastructure improvements, including the connection of three major substations in Harmon, Tumon and Tamuning with Underground Transmission Lines. This

allows repairs to take place during typhoon recovery, quickly restoring electrical service to commercial and residential customers.

As we develop our infrastructure and hasten our ability to recover, our skills and the skill of our work force will determine our success.

In 2004, the first Workforce Investment Act apprenticeship pilot program was initiated with the Guam Shipyard and the Guam Power Authority. To date, \$1.4 million has been successfully invested in hard working people who are now able to compete for higher paying jobs. I am happy to inform you that our apprenticeship training has expanded and currently includes partnerships with the Guam Hotel and Restaurant Association, the Guam Contractors Association and the Guam Trades Academy.

More than 1,800 vocational students from the Guam Public School System have successfully participated in the Passports-to-Careers program and as of last year, nearly 12,000 on-line applications were received by our One-Stop Career Center.

To meet the needs of our growing workforce, the 2010 budget calls for a 5% increase in funds to the Department of Labor. This administration will continue to support programs that will help meet the demands of the future. The jobs of tomorrow require that we educate our children today.

To that end we have built and opened new schools such as the Liguan Elementary, Astumbo Middle and Okkodo High School. I look forward to the completion of the Adacao Elementary School in the coming months.

We are taking steps to establish an interim campus for the more than 2,000 John F. Kennedy high school students. We are currently in the review, selection, and negotiation process; and we expect to issue a contract within the next 30 days. Our immediate goal is to relocate JFK students to an interim location by next school year. This temporary campus will give us time to complete a new and permanent JFK High School. Recently, Speaker Won Pat introduced Bill 52, which would allow more time for the proper and most cost effective approach to build the new JFK. I fully support this measure and I ask her colleagues to do the same.

Last year, I sought a change in the school board composition for GPSS and the passage of charger school legislation. Now, my appointees to the Guam Education Policy Board, Mr. Giovanni Sgambelluri and Dr. Lee Meadows, join the elected members in their mission to serve our students.

In addition, I applaud the Guam Legislature for passing the Charter School legislation which I signed into law in January of this year. This measure increases parent choice, places learning ahead of bureaucracy and puts teachers back in charge of their classrooms.

With more than 30,000 public school students and 42% of the general fund resources dedicated to education, I join the entire island of Guam in asking for greater accountability and good leadership at our GPSS.

Yet, education is more than a K through 12 process, and Guam's institutions of higher learning have made great strides.

The Guam Community College will soon open a new Allied Health Center which will support our efforts to meet our island's health care needs by equipping students in the Licensed Practical Nursing and Medical Assisting programs.

Through their resourcefulness, GCC has also secured nearly half a million dollars in grants to purchase equipment for the Construction Trades department and \$2.4 million for a new Learning Resource Center.

Just next door, (Governor acknowledges presence of Dr. Robert Underwood, UOG President) the University of Guam's spring enrollment increased 8.5% from the previous year, further solidifying the university's reputation as the educational hub of Micronesia. In addition to increasing certification opportunities, UOG launched a new graduate program in Clinical Psychology.

Our pride in our educational institutions must be matched by our strong financial commitment. That is why my 2010 budget gives education more than \$237 million and I ask for your full support.

As we invest in our children and their education, we remain dedicated to a healthcare system that is worthy of their promise. I want to thank Lieutenant Governor Michael Cruz for his leadership in this critical area of service to our community.

The health needs of our island are great and the demands for adequate care are high. Through the efforts of this administration, Guam was recently designated a Medically Underserved Area and was re-designated a Health Professional Shortage Area, opening the door for more medical practitioners to serve on Guam. These designations give us the edge we need to compete in a world that aggressively recruits healthcare experts.

We are committed to increasing confidence in the Guam Memorial Hospital. Over the past four years, our island's only public hospital was directed more than \$29 million of Compact Impact funds toward pharmaceuticals, capital improvement projects, and equipment. We continue to improve the recruitment and retention of critically needed healthcare professionals. In addition, GMH has received a clean audit of their financial statements.

I commend the many dedicated men and women who approach their jobs with passion and purpose. From doctors to nurses; from maintenance workers to administrators; I say thank you on behalf of the people of Guam.

A little over a week ago, we declared a mental health state of emergency and moved to secure scarce government resources toward building mental health services to meet the needs of its consumers.

Our Island's Mental Health system is faced with many challenges and I am committed to overcoming them. We are taking aggressive steps to comply with the permanent injunction requirements. During the past 8 months, they have recruited employees and they have filled essential positions. They have hired psychologists, psychiatrists, nurses and social workers and are aggressively searching for additional qualified individuals to meet important mandates.

At the Department of Public Health and Social Services, we have made great strides and saw the expansion and renovation of the community health center in Inarajan, improving services to southern residents. The Division of Senior Citizens was recognized nationally for its completion and successful implementation of the Guam Medicare Assistance Program, ensuring that our *man'amko* receive the assistance they seek. Environmental Health received funding from the Prescription Drug Monitoring grant which helps deter the illegal distribution of pharmaceutical controlled substances on our island.

In addition to improving health services for our people, we remain dedicated to their safety.

Through the combined efforts of the Guam Police Department and the Judiciary, in the words of Chief Justice Robert J. Torres as he said, "A new era of promise and possibility has begun." With the opening of a new state of the art crime lab worth \$5.9 million, evidence will be thoroughly analyzed in ways never before possible on our island. This will expedite the prosecution and conviction of criminals and exonerate those who are unjustly accused.

As we keep our island safe, we must also realize that prevention is the key. The Department of Youth Affairs has been addressing the social issues and potentially harmful behaviors facing our island's youth.

In the past year, DYA completed the new $L \dot{a} g u$ Youth Resource Center with the help of an \$800,000 grant. Last year also marked the completion of a new treatment and rehabilitation unit to help our youth struggling with addictions.

Having new facilities, new programs, and new equipment means nothing without the dedicated heroes who tirelessly work to serve our community. To the men and women of the Guam Police Department, Guam Fire Department, Department of Corrections, Customs and Quarantine Agency, our Sea Port and Airport Police, and all other uniformed officers who protect and serve our island, again on behalf of our people, I say thank you for your hard work.

Giving our public safety officers the tools they need requires a strong economy supported by secure and reliable ports of entry.

The A.B. Won Pat Guam International Airport is a proud example of what it takes to position our island for future growth and opportunities. Our airport has embarked on a new era of transformation. With 12,000 feet of expanded runways and taxiway projects underway, the airport will be prepared to receive long flight from Asia to the U.S. mainland via Guam.

Through public-private partnerships with various firms they have developed their air cargo distribution facilities. Guam will have approximately 200,000 square feet of cargo facilities

before the end of 2009 made possible by DHL, PacAir, Triple B Forwarders, CTSI and MSA Logistics-bringing our regional distribution center initiative full circle. Altogether, our airport has nearly \$150 million worth of completed and on-going projects that ensure its ability to meet the current and future demands of our transportation industry.

The Port Authority of Guam, our Sea Port, is a lifeline to our entire community. 95% of goods that our residents, businesses, and military depend on arrive through our seaport. It is an important and often overlooked service provider.

The Port has embarked on a new era of modernization and will soon fulfill its potential as a world-class seaport. I am proud to announce that we have met a significant goal in preparing our island for the future. Through public-private partnerships, 3 gantry cranes, completely refurbished at a cost of \$15 million, have arrived and will be fully operational this April. The onset of the Guam Buildup will require significant throughput of shipping containers and bulk cargo and, now, our port has the capacity to handle the increase level of activity.

The seaport's master plan was approved by the PAG Board of Directors and received conditional approval from the Legislature. It calls for nearly \$200 million to be used for port infrastructure modernization and improvements.

Last October, the Maritime Administration, or MARAD, was designated as the lead federal agency for the "Port of Guam Improvement Enterprise Program." MARAD is working with port officials on the issuance of a contract for a modernization management team.

Additionally, the port is seeking designation as a U.S. Strategic Port. This designation is assigned to seaports that the Department of Defense intends to utilize for the quick overseas movement of equipment and personnel for military exercises. This allows our port to receive higher priority when applying for federal funding.

We are confident that in the years to come, this administration will identify and secure the port's needed funding. With the leadership of those at the Port, and I commend them, we are charting a new course of growth and modernization to become a world-class seaport for Guam and all of Micronesia.

Our real estate landscape has been affected by the volatility of the global economy, yet new houses and housing subdivisions continue to be built and we anticipate the arrival of new military personnel will help strengthen our island's housing market. A moratorium on building permits in Central Guam will be lifted in April, allowing the creation and expansion of more businesses and developments.

We will pursue the long awaited senior housing project in Tumon; we will see the next phase of affordable housing projects take form; and we are seeing dramatic changes to the landscape in Upper Tumon, Pago Bay, and Talofofo. These projects make the dream of home ownership a reality.

Last month, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security approved an updated Guam-CNMI Visa Waiver Program. Under new program regulations, visa-free entry will now be allowed to non-immigrant visitors from locations such as Hong Kong, Taiwan, Australia, and Singapore. Those in our tourism industry can now expand and focus their marketing strategies to places previously untouched. With the federal government's official recognition that more locations are of economic value to Guam, we have met a significant requirement needed to pursue these new markets.

However, we join our neighbors in the CNMI in calling for a 180 day extension in the transition to this updated visa waiver program. In delaying the June 1st implementation, Homeland Security will give our governments, and themselves, the needed time to make certain that all federal requirements are met.

Due to their close proximity, the Guam Visitors Bureau plans to direct more funding towards promoting our island to the Chinese and Hong Kong markets. We recognize the economic potential and viability that both these destinations present for us and intend to capitalize on this opportunity.

Over the past year, we dealt with a decline in visitor arrivals to Guam, causing stakeholders of the tourism industry to develop innovative solutions to address the problem.

The Guam Visitors Bureau has created the "I Am Guam" branding campaign, which highlights various aspects of our island. It uses culture, language and people to cultivate a consistent and positive image of Guam. With "I Am Guam" we will promote our island as a viable travel destination to visitors worldwide.

I, along with many others, also remain committed to seeing the completion of the Guam Museum which will showcase our island's rich culture and heritage.

We will continue to take the necessary steps towards effectively promoting this coveted gem of the Pacific, our island of Guam.

After talking with key officials from both the Federal Government and Japanese Government, I can assure you, the Guam Buildup will happen. Nearly three years ago, I created the Civilian Military Taskforce by Executive order. Its mandates were very clear: plan for the Guam Buildup; do it for Guam's benefit, and most importantly, do it right.

Without the luxury of time, the CMTF was determined to rely on many perspectives. From its inception, many voices lent their expertise to the task of making this Guam's Buildup, not just the military's.

Experts, planners, private partners, federal counterparts, and community stakeholders are working to prepare us for this opportunity, giving us the tools we need to meet the challenges that we face.

In the past year, 11 sub-committees, working with the best data we could obtain, submitted our 2010 budgetary needs to the Federal Government.

My administration is aggressively pursuing these needs, making absolutely clear that though the Guam Buildup is the result of bilateral agreement between two countries, mainly the U.S. and the people of Japan. The People of Guam will not bear the cost of these decisions without being part of the process. The work of the CMTF has always been inclusive, and as such, has reserved 5 seats for our legislators.

The CMTF works not only to sustain our quality of life, but to improve it. My vision is that their work will allow those who have left Guam to return home to the sustainable and fulfilling jobs that they deserve. We must continue, and I emphasize that we must, continue to nurture and develop enduring and mutually beneficial relationships with our military partners.

Vision is a peoples' hope for a preferred future. As leaders we are expected to have a vision of where we must go and how we will get there. Our island is faced with opportunities that our leaders of the past could not have imagined. These opportunities will provide our people with what they deserve: accessible healthcare, higher paying jobs, better education, and a better quality of life.

We must act decisively to maximize and leverage our resources and position our island for the promise of prosperity that is before use.

Last year, I declared this to be a "season of transformation," and before we see the fruits of such promise, we must be diligent enough to lay the foundation. We must have enough foresight to ensure sustainability. We must acknowledge that success will require us to work together.

It is my mission as your Governor to ensure the road map for our future is secured. We have developed a 2030 transportation plan; a port improvement master plan; submitted our 2010 buildup funding requirements to the federal government; and developed a natural resource strategy.

But our work is not yet over. We are currently working on a northern and central land use plan, housing studies, and compensatory mitigation policies. We are also updating our GPA and GWA master plans.

All of our work today is paving the way for the future. In my last State of the Island Address I said that this is a time of development and opportunity. It is my vision that as the next leader of this island steps forth, and that is less than two years from now we will have a new governor, plans will have been laid; opportunities for financing will have been explored and secured; and our island will continue to move forward to the promise of our future.

My dear people. I urge you to remember that our heritage tells us that we can navigate any sea and master any challenge. It is our spirit of ingenuity and innovation that gives rise to our ability to surpass our obstacles.

Our island is known for its sense of family, immediate or extended, neighbor or acquaintance. When we are presented with a threat, we defend one another as if we were brother or sister. Our youth become our sons and daughters and this is who we are.

Now is the time to unite; to help one another; for industry to reach out to industry; and for village to reach out to village. When a family struggles, they come together and work as one. This is what we all must do. We all have good intentions. This is the strength of our community.

Today we reaffirm our commitment to do what we have promised; renewing our will to work as hard as our people expect; remembering that hope still lives because we have been blessed with the opportunity to help not only ourselves but others.

I will not spend the next two years counting down the last days of my administration or allow any member of my cabinet to do so. Complacency has absolutely no place in this administration. We will finish strong.

In words wiser than I can summon on my own, I refer to Galatians 6:9 that says "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up."

We are a people of abiding faith, sincere loyalty and profound hard work. I truly believe that we can accomplish what is difficult, achieve what is great, and overcome all obstacles. Every time we think we have measured our capacity to meet a challenge, we look back and are reminded that our capacity may well be limitless. Nothing is impossible.

To the naysayers and critics, I say to you in the words of Gene Kranz, "With all due respect, I believe this is going to be our finest hour."

As your Governor, my commitment to you is summed up by Philippians 3:13-14 which say... "By no means do I count myself an expert in all of this, but I have got my eye on the goal, where God is beckoning us onward. I am off and running and I am not turning back."

2008 STATE OF THE ISLAND ADDRESS

By the Honorable Governor Felix P. Camacho April 14, 2008

During my Inaugural Address last year, I spoke of our destiny – to move forward with unity and purpose during this time of unprecedented opportunity. My dear people of Guam, as I stand before you tonight, I am pleased to report that the leadership of your island has moved forward in this journey and we are transitioning into our Season of Transformation.

Clear direction and vision

Hafa Adai, Buenas Noches and good evening fellow citizens. It is an honor and privilege to present to you the state of our island today and, more importantly, the journey we must take moving forward. Tonight I will speak to you about the clear direction and vision we must have, the opportunities before us, the foundations we will lay and the inheritance we will leave for future generations.

Good evening Speaker Won Pat, Chief Justice Torres, Lieutenant Governor Cruz; former governors; members of the Consular Corps; Senators; Attorney General Limtiaco; Public Auditor Brooks; Archbishop Apuron and members of the clergy; Justice and Judges; Mayors; members of the elected boards and commissions; members of the military; my wife, First Lady Joann Camacho; my mother, former First Lady Lourdes Camacho; distinguished guests; my fellow citizens...

Honoring our troops

In this great tradition of sharing the state of our island, let me first personally thank the men and women from Guam serving overseas in foreign lands. History will tell that this generation of brave soldiers have made tremendous sacrifices so that our world is safer. Some have even paid the ultimate sacrifice defending this great nation that today asks us to stand at the forefront of America's future and the security of the world. We thank Guam's sons and daughters for protecting our freedom.

Trust and confidence

This is my sixth address, and I am humbled by the trust and confidence you – the people – have placed in me, Lt. Governor Cruz and my cabinet to finish the good work started in 2003. As servant leaders, we have taken our charge to do all we can in the time allotted to lay a solid foundation upon which this community will build the new Guam. From the physical destruction of typhoon Pongsona, to an ailing economy, financial shortfalls, and the most humble of circumstances, this community pulled out of that dark time and five years later, we are presented with opportunities never before imagined.

Season of hope

As I stated in my inaugural address in 2007, "The goals we set together and the countless hours of hard work we all put in have brought positive changes that many thought could not be achieved. But with unyielding faith and trust in God, with perseverance, hard work and dedication to duty – we entered our season of hope."

Guam Buildup

In a few short years, this island as we know it, will be transformed by the work we do today. The Guam Buildup, as I like to call it, has generated much excitement and confidence in the future. The accompanying investments, construction and population growth will present tremendous opportunity for new and better jobs, higher wages and an improved quality of life for the citizens of Guam. We have only one opportunity to get it right. In this upcoming period of significant growth, we must not squander this precious opportunity. Our stewardship of the resources entrusted to us will determine the inheritance we leave future generations.

We must be prepared to make sacrifices today and take bold action with a strong sense of purpose. With sheer determination we must stay the course no matter how difficult the challenges or adversities we face.

A true partnership

This will be a marathon, not a sprint one that we must all take together. In order for us to realize our full potential, we need to be equal and relevant stakeholders in this mission so we can determine the course we take. That is why I am calling for greater transparency by the Department of Defense in the process occurring in Guam. We must have a true partnership that will result in upgraded infrastructure, new schools, improved healthcare and increased public safety and social services for all of our people.

Shared responsibility

Guam's position is clear. This buildup must be a collaborative effort that benefits both our civilian and military communities. But the military's sense of urgency cannot place an undue burden on the people of Guam. The cost of this tremendous change and the financial requirements to meet their aggressive timelines should not be shouldered by our people alone, but must be a shared responsibility. The need for billions in infrastructure and social improvements demands the resources to get it done. That is why we are bringing our case to all levels of the federal government, from the President's Interagency Group on Insular Areas to the Federal Regional Council. Our engagement with the nation's leaders has led to real results.

U.S. Senate oversight hearing for Guam

Soon, I will be leaving island to testify before the United States Senate on the Guam Buildup. Congresswoman Bordallo and I are prepared to make the case that Guam needs federal support for the billions in improvements for our people. Our aggressive federal agenda is matched only by local efforts to provide the highest quality of life for our people.

Guam Master Plan

We must continue to enhance our capacity as a regional leader and hub of transportation and commerce in the Western Pacific and Asian region. It is for this reason that I established the Civilian/Military Task Force... to coordinate this government's efforts and to develop the Guam Master Plan. Already, master planning for our infrastructure and utility agencies is ongoing. The Guam Master Plan will guide the construction and renovation of roads, utilities, bridges, the sea port, the airport, new schools, medical facilities and public safety offices through an integrated effort, starting with the Fiscal Year 2010 federal budget. Infrastructure development has been

piecemeal for far too long. This must be a holistic, coordinated approach toward developing our goal of superior infrastructure that meets the demands of our community today and into the future. We must ensure that growth and development is measured, balanced and responsible.

Seaport expansion

Our mission at the seaport is the same. Our community, the military, international investors and the U.S. government all recognize how critical the seaport's successful modernization is to the 15-billion-dollars in military expansion projects and the untold sum of private enterprise goods that will flow through its docks. That is why enormous efforts are ongoing to immediately fund needed capital improvement projects. The Port Authority of Guam has nearly completed its master plan calling for up to 193-million-dollars in infrastructure and facility improvements that will modernize our seaport to better-serve our island. When this buildup reaches its height... I envision a seaport that will be the catalyst of growth and prosperity.

Buildup occurring right now

Although the Marines will not be here until 2012, the buildup of our island is occurring right now. Total defense contracts amounted to more than 136-million-dollars last year, on top of local construction activity. Road improvements in every village were made over the past five years. Soon, more than 140-million-dollars in highway construction, new roads, sidewalks, bike paths and bridges will begin. The Airport has secured more than 150-million-dollars in federal funding to expand its runways and facilities, allowing trans-Pacific flights and greater opportunities for travel to and from different points throughout the globe. A direct result of these efforts is the growth of the air cargo market, which is creating new partnerships, jobs, opportunities and increased economic activity.

Record-breaking real estate transactions

Already, the real estate market has seen a rebound and is expected to continue in an upward trend. Last year, nearly 700-million-dollars in record-breaking real estate transactions occurred. Millions of dollars were spent on hotel purchases and renovations by new owners confident in Guam's bright future. We welcomed new restaurants. Retail outlets have opened and more will be built. Housing subdivisions, new homes and condominiums are being built. We've seen several golf courses sold to new investors who are upgrading these resorts, and the trend will continue in this phenomenal rebound in the real estate sector.

Return of ancestral lands

As growth continues, we are ensuring the people of Guam benefit from the land that is rightfully theirs. That is why my Administration continues to return federal excess lands to the families of original landowners, creating new opportunities for those who have waited years for the return of their lands.

Building dreams

As leaders, we have a duty to address the impact economic growth is having on affordable housing. New programs through USDA's Rural Development office, in partnership with the Guam Housing Corporation, are making mortgages possible for those who otherwise would not be able to achieve the Dream of homeownership.

Roque and Beverly Babauta

Tonight I've invited the Babauta family as my guests to the State of the Island Address. Roque and Beverly Babauta and their children were the first family to buy a home under the Leveraged Loan Program we call Building Dreams. Their dream came true when they purchased their first home in Barrigada... and tonight they are with us. Mr. and Mrs. Babauta, please stand and be recognized. Ladies and gentlemen, we are succeeding in making homeownership a reality for the people of Guam.

National Flood Insurance Program

Even as we make homeownership possible for you, we're working to make the development of your homes and businesses less costly and more efficient. Just last week, FEMA reinstated our community into the National Flood Insurance Program, after 16 years of exclusion. This is a tremendous achievement for our people and our businesses. It reduces the cost of development for many in our community. And as we bring the American Dream of owning a home closer to you, we look forward to a strong economy that welcomes unprecedented investments to our shores.

It is this devotion to the livelihood of our people that drives our passion to improve your quality of life and address the challenges you face.

Alternative energy

One of the most pressing issues affecting our people today is the high cost of fuel and electricity. This has a direct effect on our lives as transportation costs have increased on all imported goods.

While we cannot control the global rise in the price of oil, we are working on making electricity bills less expensive. Power generation from liquid natural gas will be possible in four years. We secured 1-million-dollars in Interior Department CIP grants for a pilot wind turbine project last year. In the future, our efforts to use natural gas, wind, solar and ocean will mean cheaper electricity for the people of Guam. But that's not all.

We also are seeking assistance from the U.S. Department of Energy to provide Guam the necessary resources to lessen our dependence on fossil fuels. We look forward to this and private sector partnerships to develop alternative and renewable energy, so that as the price of fuel goes up, we will reduce its use with cleaner, more affordable sources.

Expanding tourism

As we address the issues that affect your quality of life, we are working to expand our economic base, providing you with greater opportunities. And it all starts with the driving force of our economy... tourism.

Lt. Governor Cruz and I will continue to energize this industry, which welcomes one-point-two million visitors to Guam every year. Thanks to increased economic relationships with Beijing, Guam is poised to compete for the world's fastest-growing tourism market.

The China market

Our efforts with China already brought the first charter flight earlier this year. I am establishing a

Guam China Development Council, focusing on tourism opportunities, economic development and cultural and education exchanges. And, working with Congresswoman Bordallo and members of the Senate Energy Committee, we will continue to pursue a Visa-Waiver program for Guam's most-promising market China.

People of Guam... our greatest asset

The greatest asset of our evolving economy is our people. Over the past five years, we've seen the private sector workforce grow from 39,520 jobs at the end of 2002 to 45,320 jobs at the end of last year. That is an increase of 5,800 workers or a 14 percent increase in employment!

Investing in our workforce

We've trained many residents and placed them into gainful employment. New apprenticeship programs with GPA, GWA and the Guam Shipyard have opened opportunities to many more. The Guam Trades Academy and Guam Community College are teaching skills to help our people meet their full potential. And last week, the U.S. Senate approved legislation, which will resolve a major challenge to the workforce needed for the Guam Buildup once the President signs it into law. We now are one step closer in our efforts to lift the cap on foreign workers, who are needed to construct the military and private sector facilities over the next few years. But sustainable development requires that the people of Guam – not foreign workers or temporary hires – are ready and enlisted into the careers of tomorrow that the Guam Buildup will bring.

Our future generation

We have a duty to turn opportunities into lasting prosperity for the generation that will inherit these unprecedented times. And that duty starts in the classroom, where today's students are preparing to become tomorrow's workforce. They will guide this new economy. And Guam's ability to sustain prosperity beyond the next decade will be determined by the commitment we give today toward their education and training.

Planting the seeds

Education is a sowing and reaping process. It is like a seed. It is a gradual process. It takes place like the growth of a plant or tree. A seed is planted; given some time, nourishment, care and sunlight. A huge tree bears fruit. This same principle applies to our children. The ideas that are sown in them will grow over the years and produce fruit, manifesting in every aspect of life – personal, social, political and economic.

Lack of accountability

We all know how important it is for our children to receive the best education that we can provide them. However, we can no longer afford to pour millions of dollars into GPSS without the necessary accountability for those funds, and tangible results in our children's education.

GPSS -\$2.8 billion since 1993

Since 1993, GPSS has spent more than 2-point-8 billion-dollars ... an average of 200-million-dollars each year! Yet, test scores are still low. Facilities are not maintained. Supplies are lacking. Vendors are not paid. And many high school graduates do not have the necessary skills to qualify and compete for gainful employment. Much has been given to GPSS with little to show for it. The system in place is simply not working. What we have today is the result of many

laws passed over the years to try to fix GPSS. Current law gives GPSS free reign over all the financial resources without any checks or balances... without any way for us to make certain that money is spent where it is most needed.

Paradigm shift

Billions in local and federal dollars have been spent. Good money has been thrown at a bad situation with everyone believing that if MORE MONEY was appropriated, the problems will be solved. Yet, it's only gotten worse. It is time for an institutional paradigm shift in the Guam Public School System. I am calling for:

Education... A call for action

- A change in the school board composition so that some members are elected while others are appointed... because continuity is critical to the stability of our school system.
- Restoration of Executive Branch authority over GPSS to ensure checks and balances in budgeting, procurement and personnel matters.
- Reinstatement of the Governor's authority to appoint the Superintendent.
- Outsourcing of services where necessary.
- And, the creation of charter schools within the GPSS system.

Charter schools

I have had discussions with Speaker Won Pat about her idea to implement charter schools. There are many jurisdictions where this concept has worked and, surely, some where it has not. Let us take the best practices that have been applied elsewhere and tailor them to Guam. Let us be bold in our thinking and courageous in our action. I applaud Speaker Won Pat for taking this initiative that has my full support.

Making a difference

While our community has cried out for something to be done, some people have already made a difference. Tonight I want to recognize the parents and guardians of the schoolchildren of Guam. I've invited two of them as my special guests.

George and Sheila Salas

Sheila Salas works at Juan M. Guerrero Elementary School. Her husband George was president of the island-wide Parent Teacher Association Congress. Nearly three years ago as my initiative to build four new schools was stalled, Mr. and Mrs. Salas gathered parents together, marched to the former Attorney General's office and demanded he sign the lease agreement to build new schools. Because of their collective will and influence, that contract was signed and construction started just months later. George and Sheila, please stand and be recognized!

New schools

By the beginning of the next school year, we will have three new schools ready for our children. I want to thank Speaker Won Pat for her commitment to call session on April 21 to address my proposal that will finance the equipment needed at these new schools. Senators, I ask for your support.

We will build more schools and continue advocating for more resources to find its way into the classrooms and not in the bureaucracy of the Guam Public School System. Our military partners at Andersen Air Force Base and U.S. DOE are currently negotiating a land exchange for the proposed Marbo site for another high school. General Owens, we appreciate your full commitment to this initiative.

Preparing the next generation

Lt. Governor Cruz and I share the same goals as parents and teachers across Guam. We want to prepare the next generation for the opportunities of tomorrow. We want our schoolchildren to have the best careers... to raise families in good homes... to live in a better Guam with safer neighborhoods and better access to healthcare.

Our healthcare advocate

Seventeen months ago, in the midst of rising healthcare costs and climbing rates of disease, you elected a doctor to serve along my side. Lt. Governor Cruz has been the greatest advocate of preventive and affordable healthcare ever since.

Hospital accreditation

We all know the challenges facing our island's only civilian hospital, but we continue to make steady progress. Since 2004, we have given the hospital more than 22-million dollars in Compact Impact funding. Our administration took a hospital that had numerous challenges to its survival and we are now closer than ever to receiving Joint Commission Accreditation.

Hospital expansion

And today we are working to identify different funding opportunities with our federal partners to move forward with our hospital expansion projects to meet the growing demands of our island. As we carry on our efforts to expand the facility and improve services, this Administration is placing an emphasis on preventive health care.

Preventive healthcare

The challenges we face are not hindering our work to secure a healthier future for our children. We are refocusing our island's attention on disease prevention to reduce the occurrence of diabetes, cancer, heart disease and other illnesses that are affecting the ones we love... because we must prepare our families for a healthier and safer future.

Safer streets

We have committed additional resources to your security through the years. We've hired more law enforcement officers. We've given them better equipment. We rebuilt Barrigada's fire station and built police precincts in Tumon and Dededo. Construction of the regional forensic crime lab is underway and the Emergency Operations Center will open this year.

TOPOFF 4

Our law enforcement officers and first responders excelled in TOPOFF 4, the nation's premier test of readiness to terrorism. I want to recognize those involved in T4 and all of our uniformed officers who put their lives on the line every day.

Honoring Sergeant Frankie Smith

Several months ago one of them paid the ultimate sacrifice. Sergeant Frankie Smith belongs to a hall of heroes who gave their lives protecting ours. He and the hundreds of professionals patrolling our streets, rehabilitating criminals, marshaling the courts, providing emergency aid and defending our country deserve our utmost respect and appreciation.

Our collective commitment

Along with these men and women, government employees join thousands of our people in the private sector making a difference in this time we have been given. I am grateful for the work you do each day and for our collective commitment to walk this journey together and build the foundations we need.

Government finances

We've come far and broken through many barriers to move our island forward. But we need the support of this Legislature to build the financial base that will establish greater opportunities for our people.

\$500 million deficit

Decades of government debt upon debt, and mandates without funding, threaten the good work we are doing for the future. We are faced with a half-billion dollar deficit. The government's finances jeopardize the potential of our island to grow at a time when we are preparing for this historic buildup.

My fellow citizens of Guam, time and again you have heard me speak of the urgency in addressing the GovGuam deficit. I spoke of the negative effect it is having on the lives of our people and our government's ability to provide even the most basic critical services to this community.

Fiscal responsibility

Last year, we needed to take out a loan to pay teachers... and as a result ... the government was placed on CreditWatch. Because the market recognized my administration's commitment to fix our financial problems, the CreditWatch was lifted. But the current state of our fiscal affairs and the lack of a solid financial plan to navigate our way through these times is beginning to hurt GPA, GWA and the Sea Port's ability to finance much-needed upgrades.

Fiscal Recovery and Deficit Elimination Plan

I proposed a Fiscal Recovery and Deficit Elimination Plan, which would have balanced the budget, eliminated the deficit and begin to create reserves by the year 2014. My plan was not acted on and the situation continues to worsen. And just last month, the federal district court placed the government of Guam in receivership for the Ordot Dump.

A call for collaboration

The current trend is a clear warning... inaction on the deficit will only hurt our people more. The domino effect of the deficit is escalating the problem so that it will eventually touch every aspect of our people's lives. Today, as we prepare for the tremendous opportunities that the Guam Buildup will bring, it is critical that all the leaders of Guam work collaboratively in developing a

sound fiscal plan to see us through. We must recognize the realities of the times and act accordingly. We must strategize, plan and execute to be over and on top of the circumstances and not under the circumstances. We must be in control of our destiny.

Time of transition

The time is now to restructure the debt of this government. Fear of change has paralyzed this island and the government of Guam for decades. The old ways are past us and are no longer effective. We must face the challenges that stand in the way of the promise this new season brings. We must prepare our island in this time of transition toward great things to come. Together, with cooperation, collaboration and resolve we will prosper.

Our journey is far from over

My fellow citizens, I want to thank you for inviting me into your homes this evening to share the state of our island. Although we have come a long way together, our journey is far from over. What we do now will determine the prosperity we all seek. It all starts in this time of transition When we raise the level of expectancy and pursue a higher standard of excellence for this place we all call home.

We must guard against poverty, take some risks, sacrifice and begin to invest for the future. We must stand ready to inspire action and equip our people with the skill and capacity to succeed.

Bold steps

The time of prosperity and abundance is coming. We must be steadfast in our commitment to make a difference. Anything less will fall short of the mark. We must assert our collective will, take bold steps and implement progressive initiatives to build the new Guam ... transformed and fulfilling its potential.

Embracing opportunities

The people of Guam have never shied away from challenges and we will continue that proud tradition. We will embrace the opportunities before us and turn them into lasting prosperity for all generations to come.

We will do this together.
We will do this United.
I believe that this is our calling and our mandate as a people.

I believe in all of you ... the people of Guam.

And I believe that we will be guided by God's Grace and Wisdom.
