
With over \$1 million dollars in grant monies, the Port was able to complete the Port's Comprehensive Vulnerability Assessment, CMU wall on northern perimeter of container yard, and the acquisition of security screen equipment. Repairs and upgrades to F1 fuel pier are finally complete, fully restoring one of the Port's two main fuel piers. The board of directors, management, and the entire staff are excited for long overdue repairs to be made and the acquisition of much needed new cargo handling equipment.

With the recent announcement that some 8,000 marines and their dependents would be relocating to Guam from Okinawa, the board and management need to prepare the Port for the activities associated with this move. In order for any plan to be successful, it must be flexible. Along this line, we are looking into updating our master plan. This master plan will be our documented goals for continued success for the Port's future, and as such will require great efforts in its revision.

Though teamwork efforts with our shippers and transporters, this industry will continue to stay strong. Because our workforce possess that certain versatility and vitality, I believe our Port will continue to meet challenges brought by any and all new developments for our island and the rest of the Pacific region.


iscal year 2006 turned out to be another challenging period for the Port Authority of Guam. Total tonnage for FY 2006 was 1,913,946 revenue tons, a slight drop from the previous fiscal year. Transshipment tonnage also dropped to just below 600,000. In spite of this, the number of containers handled during the year increased by 454 to 84,321 to include an upward swing in transshipment containers. The continuous demise of the garment industry in Saipan began to experience an off-set later in the fiscal year due to the new Micronesian transshipment service offered by Matson Navigation.

Total vessels calls dropped to a ten year low of 1,289. This was primarily due to the sharp decline in fishing vessels calling Guam because of increased security regulations in US ports and the relocation of fish stock to eastern waters. On the other hand, container and breakbulk vessels experienced a slight increase.

With the slight drop in tonnage and vessel calls, operating revenues declined by 5 percent totaling \$25.3 million, a decrease from the \$26.7 million reported in FY 2005. Over all, the Port saw an increase in its net assets in FY 2006 to \$48.3 million and a decrease in liabilities to just over \$14 million.

Although management continued to exercise fiscal responsibility, operating expenses grew from \$26 million in FY 2005 to \$27.3 million in FY 2006. A substantial increase was seen in expenses for the maintenance of the Port's major cargo handling equipments under a contract that was entered into with Matson Navigation in 2002. Maintenance costs jumped 53 percent from the prior year to \$3 million in FY '06. Utility costs also jumped 53 percent to \$90,000 a month, mainly due to record-high fuel and power costs. Other expenses included a 9 percent increase in insurance premiums and the continued impact of the re-instatement of salary increments in FY '05.







ome very interesting dynamics within the Port and shipping community came to light in FY 2006. In FY 2005, the Port issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to comply with Public Law 27-60 mandating the Port to privatize its terminal operations and equipment maintenance. The deadline for submission in July 2005, resulted in only three companies submitting proposals: ICTSI, Portek International and SSAT.

A five member selection committee comprised of two board members, the general manager, two senior staff employees and one alternate senior staff employee, was formed to review and evaluate each proposal based on the requirements set forth in the RFP. Well aware that their decision would determine the future of the Port and the island of Guam, the evaluation committee exercised diligence and prudence in ranking the three offors. Proposal evaluations were completed in December 2005 with ICTSI receiving the highest ranking.

In anticipation of the privatization going through, all employees were briefed by management of the process. It became clear through the series of presentations that Port employees were not in support of privatization. Employees maintained that issues raised with the law's sponsor in December 2003 would have been a much better option. Issues raised included an economic impact study to determine the effects of privatization on Guam's economy and its people, a review of the procurement law to allow the Port to purchase needed parts and equipment in a timely manner, legislation that would prohibit island leaders from raiding the Port's coffers, and allowing the Port to enter into a public-private partnership just for the maintenance of cargo handling equipment.







ICTSI filed a procurement protest and a lawsuit in Guam's Superior Court which prevented the Port from moving forward with negotiations with the second ranked offeror-Portek and placing the procurement process in abeyance.

Military Buildup

In April 2006, the U.S. Department of Defense announced that over 8,000 Marines and their dependents would be relocating to Guam from Okinawa. The exact details of the relocation and its impact on the island, especially the Port, were not provided but this



announcement magnified the need for Port improvements to ensure that the materials/goods for the military build-up are not delayed. Management began to embark on initial plans for the surge in construction materials that would be passing the docks within the next few years.

Change in Management
In June, employees were saddened by the resignation of General Manager Joseph F. and

In June, employees were saddened by the resignation of General Manager Joseph F. and Deputy General Manager Paul M. Shintaku. Mesa stepped down to run for a seat in the Guam Legislature while Shintaku was given orders by the U.S. Army Reserve for active duty. Joseph W. Duenas was hired by the Board as General Manager. Before the end of FY 2006, Joaquin P. Cruz was hired as the Deputy General Manager.



n March, Gantry 1 was decommissioned at the recommendation of Matson Navigation who was responsible for maintaining the Port's heavy lift equipment. With only two operable cranes, employees continued to perform their work as efficiently as ever. In particular, Operations handled 10 cargo vessels during the week of April 3. Average vessels calling Guam weekly is less than six. A total of 2,436 containers were handled that week, 900 more than the average. Employees were able to maintain 20 moves per hour even without Gantry 1. In fact, for most of FY 2006, Port operations maintained an average of 20 moves per hour.

The Port issued an Invitation for Bid in July 2006 to acquire a used 50 gage gantry crane. When discussing with our Consultants the price provided by the bidders on the acquisition of a used 50 gage gantry crane, it was recommended to the Board that the Port cancel the Invitation for Bid and re-







issue another procurement package to purchase a new 50 gage gantry crane. While this procurement process is ongoing, it was further recommended that the Port acquire a mobile harbor crane as an interim solution. An invitation for bid was issued for the purchase of a used mobile harbor crane, which was awarded to Mid-Pac Far East Company. The crane was purchased with Port funds for \$3.6 million. To supplement cargo operations, Invitation for Bids were also issued for eight new yard tractors and other cargo handling equipment. Delivery is expected in early FY 2007. While moving forward with acquiring new equipment, the maintenance of the current gantry cranes and straddle hoists ranked high on the Port's list of priorities. Before the end of the fiscal year, the Port's major cargo handling equipment underwent a more rigorous examination during the quadrennial inspection. The inspection included a visual assessment of the structural, electrical and hydraulic components and an additional 25% load test. The inspection showed that the Port's major cargo handling equipment is capable of being operated at the safe work load capacity. Despite the age of these equipment, the Equipment Maintenance Division managed to keep this vital asset up and running.

-1 Fuel Pier Restoration Project: In September, a ribbon cutting ceremony was held on the F-1 Fuel Pier restoration project, which cost \$2 million. Original upgrades to the pier were made in 1997 as a result of damages sustained in the August 1993 earthquake. With only two fuel piers serving the island, the contractor had to rearrange the repair work during non-bunkering operations, allowing F-1 pier to continue to funnel a significant percentage of the fuel consumed by the residents and businesses. With this challenge, the project was to be completed in July-five months after the estimated completion date.

CMU Wall: In November 2005, the chain link fence alongside Route 11 on the northern perimeter of the Port's container terminal was replaced with permanent a concrete wall. The wall was expected to minimize flood and debris within the container yard which was caused by past



storms and typhoons. The project cost \$161,044 with the Port matching 10% of the funds. The funds were received through a Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Hazardous Mitigation Grant.

Agat Marina Dock Repairs: Repairs on Agat Marina docks A, B, C & D went underway through funding assistance from Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). At a cost of \$404,496, the project was awarded to Chi Construction, Inc. in April 2006 and was estimated to be completed within a year's time. The repair work entailed the removal & replacement of wood decking, floatation drums, water & power lines, rollers on steel piles, main wooden longitude beams and holding bolts on main gangways.

Deep Draft Wharf: The Port received \$1.2 million in Fiscal Year 2003 from U.S. Economic Development Authority (USEDA) through a grant for an architectural and engineering (A&E) design of a deep draft wharf to be located between Hotel Wharf and Seaplane Ramp. The project awarded to TG Engineers for the A&E design was completed in September 2006. The economic impact study (EIS) coordinated through U.S. Army Corps of Engineers was expected to be completed in 2007. TG Engineers presented the project to the Board of Directors and provided an estimated construction cost of \$80 million.

Homeland Security Grants: The Transportation Security Administration Grant program allocated \$280,200 to the Port for procurement of a CCTV surveillance system, prefabricated portable fencing, compact x-ray surveillance system, walk-through metal detector and hand-held devices for passenger vessel arrivals. The purchase of these items would allow the Port Police Division to expeditiously process visitors from passenger vessels in a more efficient manner and to comply with the mandates of the Maritime Security Act.

The Office of Homeland Security Grant Program also provided \$50,000 to the Port to fund a comprehensive vulnerability assessment study of its facilities. The study was awarded to Duenas, Bordallo & Associates and provided the Port with detailed survey identifying the vulnerability of the Ports' facilities in the event of a terrorist activity and recommendations to strength its facilities to meet the Homeland Security guidelines and standards.







